Ordinance No. 48.

AN ORDINANCE creating a Board of Health.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Councilmen of the city of Platts-

Section 1. That a board of health, consisting of from three (3) to five (5) resident freeholders of the city or Plattsmouth, a majority of whom shall be regular physicians in good standing is hereby created; said board of health shall be elected by the city council at its first regular meeting after the pas sage of this ordinance, and thereafter said board of health shall be elected annually immediately after the appointment of the standing committees in each municipal year.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the said board of health at its first meeting after the members thereof are electmouth met last night at the Court ed by the city council, to elect one of its members chairman, and the city clerk is hereby made the clerk of said toard of health, and the city marshal is hereby made its police officer. It shall be the duty of the clerk to at keep a full and accurate record of all proceedings in a book to be provided for that purpose, and it shall be the duty of the police officer to attend all meetings of said board, as d to faithits duties.

Sec. 3. The chairman of said board of health shall be the health officer of the city, before whom all complaints of | quently passing by such offensive liqnuisances injurious to the health of the city shall be made by any citizen de siring to debate the same; during the recess of said board, and the health officer is hereby granted authority upon any such complaints being duly made in writing and properly sworn to be fore an olicer authorized to administer oaths, and laid before him, to direct the police officer of said board to abate said nuisance within a reasonable time. and all such orders issued by the health officer during the recess of the board, shall be in writing properly signed by him, and he shall report all such actions to the board of health at its next meeting tog ther with all the papers

pertaining to each complaint.
Sec. 4. The board of health provid ed for in this ordinance shall meet on the 2d and 4th Wednesday of each month for the transaction of such business pertaining to the health of the said board, or any two of its members it is deemed expedient to call a special meeting, then the purpose and objec of said special meeting shall be reduced to writing and properly signed by the chairman of said board or any two of its members, and placed in the hands of its police officer, whose duty it shall special meeting u on all the members and officers of said board to meet in accordance with the provisions of said special call, and upon due service of said notice to meet, it shall be the duty of all members and officers of said board to comply with the call, and meet at the time and place specified in said notice of special meeting.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of said board of health to draw up and recommend the passage of any ordinances, which in its judgment are required for the preservation of the health of this shall be committed to jail for such percity and submit the same to the city council for approval, and the names of all members of said board recommending the passage of such ordinances shall be affixed in their own handwriting to the recommendation accompany-

ing the same. Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the board of health to carefully examine into any alleged nuisarces within the city, and for this purpose they are clothed with authority to summons parties before them for the purpose of examination, provided, however, that before any examination of parties take place the clerk shall swear said parties n the usual form before hearing their testimony, and all such testimony shall

be reduced to writing.
Sec. 7. The board of health shall have charge of all matters pertaining to the health of the city, and relating to the sanitary condition thereof, and shall make any recommendation they forced. By order of the board ofhealth deem proper for the interests of the health of the citizens thereof, to the city council, and all such recommendations shall be in writing, and signed by all the members of the board and attested by its clerk.

During the prevalence of contagious diseases, said board of health shall submit to the city council such regulations and quarantine laws for approval as in its judgment is demanded and for proposes that no guilty man escapes. this special purpose said regulation and quarantine laws, when approved and passed by the city council, shall extend and be in force within five miles of

the city.
Sec. 8. In every instance when it becomes known to any member or officer of the board of health, that any legal health ordinance of this city is being violeted by any person or persons within said city, it shall be the duty of such member or officer to file 2 proper information before the police judge of this city, whose duty it shall be to ferthwith commence proceedings against such person or persons.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the

City Clerk to read the proceedings of said board of health to the City Council immediately after the reading and approval of the City Council proceed-

Sec. 10. All fines collected by the police judge or city marshal against any persons tried for a violation of any health ordinance, shall be promptly paid over to the city treasurer, who shall keep an accurate account of the same under the title of board of health

Sec. 11. Each member of the board of health shall receive for his services at each meeting of said board at which business is transacted, the sum of two dollars. The clerk of said board shall receive for his services the same as the members of the board, and the marshal shall receive for his services for each meeting of said board at which he is

the same and the s

vices shall be paid for in warrants drawn by the order of the city council upon the proper auditing of such accounts for services on said board. And ail such warrants shall be drawn upon the board of health fund.

Sec. 12.-This ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to

ORDINANCE NO. 50.

AN ORINANCE providing sanitary regulations and to secure the general health of the city of Plattsmouth:

Be it ordained by the mayor and ouncilmen of the city of Plattsmouth; Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to east or leave exposed in any street, avenue, lane, lot, water course, or any other places within the limits of this city, the carreass of any dead animal, or any putrid or unsound meat, fish, vegetables, or any other subtend all meetings of said board and stance which might become offensive, or to make up, use, keep, or permit in his or her house, shop, store. factory, workshop, outhouse, barn, stable, cellar, water closet, privy, yard, lot, or any other place within the limits of fully obey the directions and order of this city, any noisome or offensive liqsaid board in the lawful discharge of quids or any other substance, which might become annoying to the neighborhood, or injurious to the health of those citizens residing near or freuid or other substance; or to throw any filth or offal, or any othe liquid or solid offensive substance into any street, avenue, alley, lane, lot, water course, or any other place within the limits of

this city. Sec. 2 All public stables, pig pens, pig yards and cattle or stock yards with in the limits of this city shall be kept in a clean condition, and no accumula tion of filth shall be permitted at, in or near the same; and all private stables, pig pens, pig yards and cattle or stock yards shall be kept in a cleanly and

non-offensive condition. Sec. 3. All water closets and privies are hereby required to be kept in a clean and wholesome condition and no accumulation of filth within the same shall be permitted at any time to reach a point nearer the surface than four feet. It sha'l be the duty of the proprietors thereof to throw a sufficient city as may be brought before it; but amount of some disinfecting agent, if in the opinion of the chairman of the board of health, into such privies and water closets, at least twice in each week, to-wit: on Wednesdays and Saturdays to thoroughly disinfect the

Sec. 4. The decision of the board of health on the question of cleanliness and non-offensive condition mentioned be to immediately serve said notice of a special meeting upon all the members binding upon all parties concerned.

Sec. 5. The city marshal is hereby charged with the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance, subject to the order of the board of health.

Sec. 7. All persons violating the provisions of this ordinance, or failing to comply with the requirements thereof, shall upon conviction before the police judge of this city be fined not less than five (5) dollars nor more than one hundred (100) dollars; and in default of payment of the fine adjudged iod as the police judge shall in accordance with the law, adjudge against

such party or parties. Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to

It is your duty to comply with the provisions of these ordinances, and whether you do or not, you twenty days' notice to the citizens of Plattsmouth is nereby given to put their premises in a healthy condition At the expiration of that time a thorough inspection will be made of the entire city, and any person found living in violation of the ordinances will be prosecuted, without regard to color or previous condition, and the board By order of the board of health.
