## In Case of a Fire.

Capt. Shaw, the well known chief of the London Fire brigade, in a magazine article on the protection of dwelling houses from fire, says: "There is a great deal of faulty construction in houses in consequence of architects being seldom employed. Cracked walls are almost sure to give way in case of fire.

\*Party' walls should be carried at least three feet above the highest part of the roofs. All roofs should be provided with windows or openings by which the inmates of a house could escape in the event of the stairs becom-ing impassable. The best material for stairs is wrought iron and the worst stone, since the latter yields to an amount of heat which does not affect ordinary respiration. Whenever a house has both wooden and stone stairs the inmates should, in case of fire, invariably make for the wooden stairs, as affording the only hope of escape."-Chicago Herald.
