WORKINGMAN'S ARGUMENT AGAINST FREE TRADE.

A number of farmers and workmen were discussing the tariff, a short time ago, in a country store in New Jersey.

"Yes, I suppose so," he said; "but let us do a little figuring. If wool is put on the free list, we shall probably be able to buy clothing at about 20 per cent, less than we pay now."

"Yes, that's so," they answered, "and who can object to that?"

"Well, then, wages will go down, too, won't they?"

"Probably they will."

"And in about the same proportion?"

"Yes, but what of it? Things will not be any worse off than they are now."

"I don't know about that. Let us see. I can earn \$40 a month. Twenty per cent. of that would be \$8. Now I get a good suit of clothes for \$20, and buy two suits a year. So if I get them for 20 per cent. less I could save \$8."

"Certainly. You would get them \$8 cheaper."

"But if I lose \$8 a month in wages, that is \$96 for the year. And free trade would enable me to save \$8 in clothes, but I should lose \$96 in wages. I rather think under the circumstances protection would be better for us after all."

The Toledo Blade very truthfully says. If the condition of the workingmen in this country was not better than in any other, it is likely that they would pour by the thousands upon its shores? Facts are most convincing of all arguments. They know that they receive better wages, have steadier employment and live more comfortable here than anywhere else on the face of the earth, and that is the reason they are constantly swarming thither. Free trade would inevitably change this state of things.

THE CONDUCT OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS BY THE present administration has been distinguished by inefficiency and cowardice. Having withdrawn from the senate all pending treaties effected by republican administrators for the removal of foreign burdens and restrictions upon our commerce and for its extension into a better market it has neither affected nor proposed any others in their stead. Profoundly unwise and unbecomingly un-American in its policy, it has rendered the extension of foreign trade and commerce into a barren and sterile wilderness among our neighbors. It has refused to charter, sanction or encourage any American organization for the construction of the Nicaragua canal, a work of vital importance to the maintenance of the Monroe doctrine and of our national influence in Central and South America, and necessary to the development of trade with our Pacific territory, with South America, and with the further coasts of the Pacific Ocean.

AGAINST PAUPER AND LABOR TRUSTS. We declare hostility to the introduction into this country of foreign contract labor and of Chinese coolies, and to any legislation which would extend to our constitution, and we demand the rigid enforcement of existing laws against it and favor such amendments as will exclude such labor from our shores.

WE DECLARE OUR OPPOSITION to all combinations of capital organized in trusts or other forms to control arbitrarily the condition of trade among our citizens and we recommend to congress and the state legislatures in their respective spheres such legislation as will prevent the execution of all schemes to oppress the people by undue charges on their supplies for the transportation of their products to market.

WE APPROVE LEGISLATION BY CONGRESS to prevent the use of unfair and unfair discrimination between states.

PUBLIC LAND LEGISLATION. We reaffirm the policy of appropriating the public lands of the United States to be homesteads for American citizens and settlers, not aliens, which the republican party established in 1821 against the persistent opposition of the demagogues who would have transferred our great western domain into magnificent developments. The restoration of unearned land to the public domain, which has been the result of the restoration of unearned land to the public domain in pursuance of conditions inserted by the republican party in the original grants. We charge the democratic administration with failure to execute laws securing to settlers title to their homesteads and with using appropriations made for that purpose to harass innocent settlers with spies and prosecutions under the false pretense of exposing frauds and vindicating the law.

ADMISSION OF TERRITORIES. The government by congress of the territories is based upon necessity only to the end that they may become states in the union; therefore, whenever the condition of people, material resources, public intelligence, and morality are such as to insure stable local government therein the people of each territory should be permitted a right, inherent and state to form for themselves constitutions and state governments and be admitted into the union. WE DENOUNCE THE HOSTILE SPIRIT which the federal union has manifested in its vetoes of measures for pension relief, and its action of the democratic house of representatives in refusing even consideration of general pension legislation.

IN SUPPORT OF THE PRINCIPLES HERETOFORE enumerated we have the co-operation of patriotic men of all parties, especially all working men whose prosperity is seriously threatened by the free trade policy of the present administration.

Therefore we propose the republican party to appropriate legislation asserting the sovereignty of the nation in all the territories where the same is questioned, and to furtherance that end to place upon the statute book legislation stringent enough to divorce political from ecclesiastical power, and thus stamp out the attendant wickedness of polygamy.

THE REPUBLICAN PARTY is in favor of the use of both gold and silver as money, and condemns the policy of the democratic administration in its efforts to demote silver.
