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## BRAVEST OF SHERIFFS.

Tom Cunningham of San Joaquin County, California.

## HIS WONDERFUL MUSEUM.

Pistols, Knives, Swords, Dirks and Clubs that Have Done Murder - O'Fas Ioned Burglar Tools - Bad Coins.

Tom Cunningham has been sheriff of San Joaquin county, Cal., for twenty-one years, longer in continuous service in that office than any other man in the state or probably any other in the country. He won't talk much except about his "collection." That is the only subject that excites him, and it is a bouquet of beauties. In it is an ax which a Chinaman used to lay open another's head; a Chinese eye which the wearer tried to hang himself with in jail, and which was then sent off; a Mexican sword with which five men were killed in 1890; pistols of all makes and sizes, from a little pepperbox to a Colt's navy revolver; a little penknife with which a Spanish woman stabbed and killed a man, and the immense, wide, heavily stained sword which was found in his horse and which figured in her trial, blackened knives and bright dirks which were the instruments of murders; sharp steel of many sorts, some of the blades being three feet long; counterfeit coin that was found in a camp of makers of the queer in the county and the nickel which saved a man's life by diverting the course of a bullet.

The collection was begun, however, in 1854 by the then sheriff, Richard Porter Ashe, father of the present noted turfman, Porter Ashe. Dr. Ashe, as he was called, hanged the notorious "Dutch Fred" and

"Mountain Jim" in 1851, and began the museum with their pistols. They are great, clumsy weapons, and it is not at all surprising on viewing them why men used to carry their shooting irons in full view. They could not be hidden.

One naturally supposes that the men hanged in those times were desperadoes. That supposition is wrong. They were strung up for horse stealing. In that period horses were more precious than human lives, and at that time and for many years after the sheriff of San Joaquin county had much to do tracing stolen horses and chasing the thieves.

The law was repealed at an early day, and the last eight or ten hanged in the county were murderers. A noticeable object in the museum is a coat of mail, made of small links of steel, which was taken from a murderer when he was arrested for killing his son-in-law. He, too, was hanged. In a case with other guns is one with a long barrel, which is labeled as the weapon that killed the one-noted bandit, Joaquin Murietta, at Cantua creek, Fresno county. Sheriff Cunningham thinks the toughest man he ever had to handle was Jim Winters, who shot the daughter of General James A. Shepherd while he was attempting to commit a burglary. As he lingered a year he escaped conviction for murder, served his term for burglary, killed another young lady at Santa Rosa under exactly similar circumstances and was sent up for life.

Long after he reached the penitentiary it was found that he had many instruments to aid him in escaping. These were found in the soles of his shoes and the lining of his clothes when Sheriff Cunningham took him to Stockton from the penitentiary. He had a slim file inserted in the back of a comb, covering the opening with black wax; a wooden key, which he had cut out himself and which was to be employed for opening cell doors; a pair of nippers and a sharp pointed knife blade. A flannel pin cushion that he had at the time was ripped open and checks for \$1,200 on San Francisco banks were found in it. Despite the vigilance of the guards he had kept all these things.

When they stepped out of the cars at San Joaquin, Winters was ahead and dexterously slipped under the car. He thought the sheriff would go over the platform to the other side to catch him, but quick as a flash Cunningham slid under the car also and grabbed him by the neck. They wrestled and twisted beneath the car. The sheriff did not have time to cry out to the engineer, and nobody else had stepped off the front platform with the other and his prisoner. Had the trap sprung both of them would have been killed or maimed. The sheriff exerted his strength to drag Winters out and did not draw his pistol. Fortunately he got the convict out just in time. A moment after he rolled him from under the car and jerked him to his feet the engine puffled and the train moved on.

The Mexicanos grant in San Joaquin county was long the scene of an agrarian war, and in 1851 the settlers rose in arms to possess a levy. They numbered thirty-six, with repeating rifles and pistols. Sheriff Cunningham knew that if he went to the place with his deputies or a posse and tried to dispossess the settlers by using armed force a conflict would be inevitable and lives would be lost. He called on the governor for troops and a brigade was sent to the grant. The presence of the military was enough to restore the authority of the law, and after staying there ten days the troops returned home. That a bloody meeting was avoided by this course was apparent.

Such a record few of the incidents which have given Tom Cunningham his sobriquet of "bravest of sheriffs." He was first elected in 1851 and has held continuously ever since. His longest chase was after the famous bandit, Vasquez, an account of which one of the party has written under the title of "Sixty Days in the Saddle."
