EARLY POTATOES.

Select For Seed Potatoes That Are Known

to Mature Early. In selecting seed potatoes for an early crop we do not trust enough to the potatoes that naturally mature early, says n writer in The American Cultivator He says good preparation of the soil and good after cultivation are not softcient to produce an early crop. The Early Rose received its name because of its ovidences of growing and a creshould be realized in from 55 to Cycley s This potata still stands well for an or crop, although it does not have the widespread popularity it once had.

The authority quoted says: "For a potato that can be planted in the soil very early in the season, and that will ripon early and yield a good crop, there is none that surpass the Early Ohio. This potate has an abundance of good qualieight heur law as affecting that ties, and its earliness of maturity is not the least. The potatoes are large and uniform, and a hill pulled up from 45 to 55 days after planting will present a pleasing sight. In selecting these seeds, however, it is quite essential that there should be no feeble eyes. When potathe act in question, and insisted on soil is generally cold and damp, and the tendency is for the seed to rot before it sprouts. This will generally be the case unless each piece has strong eyes that are vigorous and full of life.

"Do not plant too early, especially when the soil is thick and heavy. No seed can grow much in cold, wet, clammy soil. The seed potato put in such soil will simply remain dormant for a number of days and have the vitality impaired by the aucongenial surround ings. They do not get a good start, and the potatoes are more apt to be small and half developed. There is no set time for planting early crops, for too much depends upon the soil and the season.

"When the polatoes are planted early, they need plenty of barnyard manure in the soil, manure that is well rotted, This is heating to the soil, and it is much better early in the season, than any artificial fertilizer.

Spring Care of Rees

The bees should be looked after the first warm days that come. Have the new hives with top boxes and frames all ready before other spring work takes up the time. Whether they are allowed to swarm naturally or are divided artificially, it is well to be ready for them in good season. If there are well cleaned. If there is empty comb on hand, see that it is in good condition. and if there is not enough get sheets of foundation enough to fill the frames in the new hives and to replace that in the boxes on the old hives.

Onions From Seed.

Onions grown to commercial size in the usual way, if set out the next spring. soon enlarge to size fit for table. The difference between the two is chiefly caused by different cultivation. In the one case the onion, under favorable conditions, matures from the seed the first season; in the dwarfed condition it requires a second season for full maturity.

FENCES IN THE GARDEN.

for Side or Rear End of a Lot-One Style of Portable Fence.


Notwithstanding the hoe and cry raised every season against the useless waste of fencing for village or smal gardens, in many localities inclosureare a necessity. When a fence is required, it pays to have a good one. At

Instead of the ordinary board fence with straight top, one made after the pattern here shown affords relief to the North Sixth Street, Plattsmoute eve among so many straight topped fences and is less inviting to boys who climb and play on fences. In any event the back yard fence should be mantled TIMOTHY : CLARK. with climbers of several kinds. Amperopsis and climbing loniceras are fine for this purpose.

Where a cow is kept on a small farm Coal and Wood. it is often a matter of convenience to have a few dozen panels of fence that car be used in improvising a temporary pasture lot. The form of panel shown in the second cut has, according to American Gardening, from which the

The Indian Games.

The Indian games, a thoroughbred va riety of fowls that has gained popular ity during the past two years in this country, are largely bred in England and differ somewhat from the other games. The cock weighs about nine pounds, and the hen from six to sever pounds. The body is firm, compact and nuscular. The carriage and style of the cock is very apright and commanding giving an appearance of vigor and ac tivity. The feet are large, clean and flat: the head of medium length and width; eyes full, with a bold expression: face smooth and fine in texture; comb. pea, small, fine and closely set on the head; wattles scanty; ear lobes small. The plumage is short and glossy; neck and tail are glossy green-black, with a large proportion of dark crimson plumage on saddle; wings, etc.

In England the Indian game is ranked along with the Dorking for the dressed poultry market. It is claimed by American breeders that this breed grows rapidly, and the body of the fowl, being plump and round, is adapted for the table. It is also claimed that for crossing on common hens, to produce table poultry, the Indian game has no equal. The hens are good layers of medium sized eggs.

Essentials In Corn Culture.

A speaker at an Iowa meeting of farmers remarked that there are four essentials to the production of first class corn -proper preparation of the soil, good seed, uniform distribution and thorough cultivation. If the surface soil is properly cared for, the subsoil will take care, annual interest it deposited one of itself. It is a question whether sum- year. mer plowing is good where land must be subject to action of mud and rain. Drill planting is preferable, putting kernels 12 THOS POLLOCK to 16 inches apart in the rows. Drilled corn will mature 10 days sooner than hill planted and is easier to husk.

The objection to drill cultivation of corn ought not to be considered, now that improved tools exist for tending it. In hill culture there can be no uniformity of cultivation as regards time be tween plowings, while with drilled corn all can be treated alike. The planted field should be gone over once in four days before the corn is up and as often after that as possible. The assertion was made that the days of long pointed shovels are numbered, and they should be done away with altogether. The increase from shallow cultivation was equal to 20 per cent. The advantage of shallow cultivation is more noticeable in a dry season than in a wet one.
