NEBRASKA NOTES. Crops never were more promising in the state at this time of year. Judge M. L. Hayward will deliver the Fourth of July oration at Weeping Water. The independents of Dakota county will hold a mass county convention the 11th of July. The \$14,000 bridge bonds of Healey precinct, Lincoln county, carried by a vote of almost three to one. The Free Methodist evangelists have deserted North Platte to take the strongholds of sin in Custer county. C. E. Joyce of Weeping Water has an artificial lake covering several acres, which is from four to ten feet deep. Burglars entered the drug store of Charles Stillman at Columbus and took what money was in the till and a few cigars for good measure. The appearance of an ugly looking cloud caused the worshippers in the Congregational church at Crete to "saw off" the service and hustle home. It is estimated that wheat will not average over fourteen or fifteen bushels per acre in Dixon county. The rust damaged it considerably and will cut the crop short, but indications are that it will be a good quality. Last week one or two Poncaites went down to the Dakota county lakes to fish using nets. They were arrested and taken to Dakota City for trial. One got off for \$5 and the other, the owner of the land where the fishing was done may test the law. John H. Anderson, a veteran of Polk county, has been allowed back pension amounting to \$1,300. He went out in the beginning of the war, was a prisoner ten months and one time condemned to be shot. His claim has been pending since the early '70's. A buffalo consigned to W. F. Cody came in from the east recently. It was shipped from the wild west show and will be used for breeding purposes at the Cody ranch.
