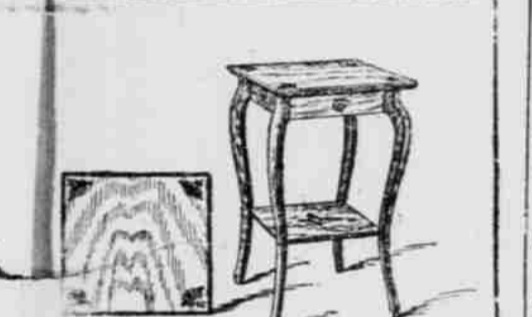

In the meantime Wilkins came to this city and was apparently having a good time. The Mills county grand jury was just winding up its session and the case was brought before that body where sufficient proof was added to indict the fellow of grand larceny.
