

THEIR DOOM IS SEALED

A Fight or a Foot Race Now for Spain.

SATURDAY MORNING THE HOUR

Appointed When Spain Must Quit Cuba or Meet America in Mortal Combat—Naval Circles Active and Making Preparations for War.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20, 4:00 p. m.—[Special to the News.]—President McKinley signed the resolutions and ultimatum today at 11:31 and gives Spain until Saturday morning to evacuate Cuba and leave her free to establish and maintain her own free government. Failure on the part of Spain to comply with the terms of this ultimatum means a settlement of the difficulties at arms. If this is to be the solution the matter President McKinley will use all the power at his command, throw all the force of the nation into the breach and strike the most powerful blow our government is capable of to enforce the demands of our nation, avenge our wrongs and leave Cuba a free and happy people.

Operations in the navy department are very active and preparations are being made to prosecute the war, if war is to be in such a manner as to make it quick and decisive. The flying squadrons is one of their chief activities and everything is being made ready for a successful and bitter fight when the time for action comes. The minutest details are being looked after with the utmost care and precision.

Spain gives not the slightest indication of complying with terms of the ultimatum and there is nothing to warrant the conclusion that she will, in short, she proposes to die game or maintain her hold upon Cuba.

THE NAVIES WILL FIGHT

The Squadron and the Flotilla Sailing To Meet.

THE CLASH WILL COME SOON.

Spain Ready To Fight and War is Now on—Fays no Heed to McKinley's Ultimatum—Would Not Listen to It.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 21, 4 p. m.—[Special to the News.]—Minister Woodford received his passports today before he could present the ultimatum to the Madrid authorities. This action on Spain's part was forestalled by serving the ultimatum on the Spanish minister here simultaneously with Woodford at the Spanish court. Spain had no desire to receive the ultimatum, but she had no recourse.

Spain is not disposed to dilly-dally and instead of showing a sign of weakness is preparing to make the best fight possible.

Minister Woodford left Madrid at 4 o'clock today, Spanish time, and is now on French soil.

Spain is all ready for a fight and events will move rapidly from now on until the controversy is brought to a settlement.

Spain's refusal to even listen to our ultimatum and her treatment of our minister is another insult to America in the long list of Spain's crimes.

A Paris dispatch states that a national subscription was started in that city today and \$50,000 was promptly subscribed for Spanish aid.

Minister Woodford before leaving Madrid turned the legation over to the British embassy and diplomatic relations between the countries are at an end and war is thus declared.

The crisis is at hand, and nothing can avert a clash of arms. The North Atlantic squadron has sailed for Havana and the Spanish flotilla has left the Cape Verde westward bound, destination unknown.

There is no longer any doubt but a clash will occur between the American and Spanish navies in Cuban waters within the next few days.

SPRIECK RETURNS HOME

The Sheriff Located His Cattle in Holt County.

Sheriff Wheeler and Gottlieb Sprieck returned home last evening after a long and tireless chase after the latter's cattle. They were traced from the possession of the thief to the B. & M. here, then to Wallace & Co. South Omaha then through the hands of three other commission firms and finally to the Elkhorn railway where they were billed to a man named Skidmore who resided near Ewing up in the sand hills. The sheriff and Mr. S. boarded the first train for Ewing and went out to the Skidmore ranch. They found the proprietor was an old Cass county man who used to work for Henry Eikenberry. He treated his guests very nicely and soon found the cattle which Mr. Sprieck identified at once. Mr. Sprieck could have recovered his cattle and taken them home with him and then the ranchman would have looked to the man he purchased from and he in turn from his seller until finally the less would have to be borne by Wallace & Co., who purchased from the thief. As Wallace would have the bill to pay anyway Mr. Sprieck concluded to leave the cattle and settle direct with Wallace as the freight home would be quite an item for him to pay to get the cattle back on his farm. The sheriff was tireless in his efforts to secure the stolen property to the owner. He also learned that one of the Bellvue McCarty's went with the thief to sell the cattle and claimed that he (Ma)ton lived on the Iowa bottoms at East Plattsmouth and that his wife had just died and he wanted to sell off his stock and quit farming. The story thus told by McCarty was entirely false and he may have had a hand in the theft. Every clue will be followed up and no expense will be spared by Sheriff Wheeler to bring the thief or thieves to speedy justice.

Attempted Rape

Word reaches us from Weeping Water of a startling sensation in that city wherein a man by the name of Klepper is under arrest for rape. Our information is to the effect that a painter and his wife recently moved to that town from Omaha. Yesterday the lady was alone at her home when Klepper assaulted her. The lady succeeded in extricating herself from the grasp or her assailant before he had defiled her. She gave an alarm and the man was placed under arrest. A boy, who was in an adjoining room, heard the scuffling and the woman's defense, and attracted by the noise, peeped through a window and witnessed the struggle. Klepper had his hearing today and it is the opinion of our informant that he will be bound over to the district court and not admitted to bail. Feeling runs high against Klepper at Weeping Water over the assault.
