Death of Major Anderson. HOT SPRINGS, S. D., Nov. 17.—Maj. Albert R. Anderson, after a long illness from blood poisoning, died at 11:30 today. He was a prominent politician of southwestern Iowa for many years, having defeated Hepburn for congress for one term. He moved to Hot Springs in 1892 and has figured strongly in South Dakota politics since that time. He recently made a trip to the national G. A. R. encampment at Cincinnati to present the claims of this city for a national sanitarium and contracted the disease that carried him to his death on this trip. His remains will be taken to Sidney, Ia., his old home, for interment.
