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### OFFICIAL PAPER OF THE CITY.

The Alabama legislature has appropriated \$500 to purchase a memorial sword for Lieutenant Hobson. Iowa ought to do as much for one of Hobson's men who went down with the Merrimac and who resides at or near Denison.

WITH ten new republican senators to take the place of popocrats in the national legislature and with a working majority in the lower house a fair test of the value of a republican administration during the next two years will be had. The business element has renewed confidence and faith in the future as it is known that there will be no fiat money legislation, no effort to pay debts with cheap dollars, and that the revenues of the government will equal its needs for money.

The Spaniards are getting ready to peacefully yield up the Philippines, and from latest reports no danger exists of further serious complications. The board of commerce in all the leading cities in Spain favor prompt acquiescence in the demands of the United States and the dilatory tactics of the fexy Sagasta are not approved. From the meagre reports furnished it seems the American commissioners are authorized to offer Spain \$20,000,000, that being the value of the public buildings and public works which Spain has paid for.

AN Atchison minister, quoted by The Globe says "there is no such word as Sunday; that it is Sabbath." Speaking as a follower of the Hebrews, he is right; the Jews had a name for only one day of the week, the seventh, which was their chief day, for reasons given in the second chapter of Genesis they called it "Sabbath," or "rest." But speaking as an American, he is far from right. Our fathers had names for all seven days before they ever heard that there were any Jews. They named them after the divinities, or "divine manifestations, that were known to them, the Sun and Moon, Woden, Thor and Froya; the first day of the week being foremost in their eyes, as it is still to their descendants, they named it for the Sun, the best thing they knew of; it did not occur to them to dedicate it, or any minor day, to rest; they were a restless people, and their ideal was activity, rather than repose.—The Conservative.
