Aside from the Alliance branch, which is now under construction, the Burlington has about completed laying new steel rails of heavy weight, between Omaha and La Plate. As soon as this piece of work is done the steel gang will be moved to South Omaha, where new steel rails will be put in from South Omaha to De rfield, a portion of the steel gang already being on the ground.
