MASQUERADE BALL.

Big Fellow Will Have to Give Up Life of Ease and Pleasure For Hard, Hard Work-Experts Say if He Can Train He Can Come Back.

Youth and You'll See.

TASK THAT COMPRONTS JEFF.

TRAIN.

"Can Jeff come back?" This much mooted question will be decided when the big Californian faces Jack Johnson in the ring in San Francisco on Independence day, when the pair will try hard to muss each other up for the consideration of \$101,000 and the undisputed title of the world's heavyweight championship. His ability to come back will be decided then, and not until then, despite opinions of many fight experts. Opinions have been exploited and various arguments have been expounded by these experts to back up their claims. One expert, and a man who ought to know, recently said:

"I do not believe Jeffries will ever come back. He has yet to show that he can, and if he does he will make history. But any man who can train can fight. The fighting in itself is the least part of the game. It's in the training that a man's mettle is tried. And because Jeffries has proved to a degree his willingness and ability to train his admirers are convinced he will be there when he meets Johnson. Would that I could disillusion them. "True it is that only a game man

can train. I do not charge Jeffries with cowardice or lack of gameness, for he is anything but a coward and is game to the core. And of course he has the stamina to train.

"This question of training must not be overlooked by pugilistic fans. Training does not mean one, two or three minutes' rope skipping before the foot lights, then, by way of amusing an audience, a round of punching a bag of the friendly setto of a 'drilled' scheduled sparring companion. Training is prolonged work not born of or becoming to the calcium's rays. Can Jeffries. who retired to a life of luxurious ease for six years, during which time his vital organs became accustomed to the new conditions, train strenuously? Can he take off the fat that still clings to city today looking after business meets Johnson? Can he make steel from the soft sinews that now are his? Can he do these things and still be there? We shall see. "Training as the layman views it is a pleasant pastime, but to Jeffries of a man in his condition it means agonies. But when the big fellow hark-. ened to public clamor he came forth, and had the heart and gameness t put comfort, ease and luxury aside and buckle on the armor and attempt to claim for the white race the championship title. He must battle for the honor. The crucial time has come. He must train. Only those who have trained can begin to appreciate what it means to give up stimulants, rich foods, late hours, idleness and boon companions for plain food, early hours and hard, hard work. "When Jeffries came back from the quiet life he weighed nearly 280 pounds. He will not fight at this weight. He is clumsy at his best. To reduce his weight to a fighting condition will require hard work, and a palm must be handed the big fellow for his game attempt. By abstaining from his accustomed habits of lazy life and refraining from indulging his appetite Jeffries has reduced his weight. It is at present 230 pounds. But all pugilists have a dislike for the scales, and I believe Jeffries is no exception. True, he has indulged in many training turns, such as skipping the rope and bag punching, dumbbells, road work and wrestling, though hardly think he has reduced his weight enough yet.
