IS HONORED.

Good Selection Made by Governor Shallenberger.

Hon D. O. Dwyer of this city received notification from the capitol at Lincoln, this morning that Governor Shellenberger had honored him with the appointment on the board of Trustees of the School for the Deaf at Omaha and the Blind at Nebraska City. Mr. Dwyer is appointed to fill a vacancy made by the resignation of W. R. Patrick, of Sarpy county. The situation came to Mr. Dwyer without solicitation, and while the duties are not entirely clear, we predict that our townsman will acquit himself with credit. Mr. Dwyer's commission will arrive today.

Carthage and Carterville Resolve to try the Dry Method a While.

By majorities of 172 and 132 respectively, Carthage and Carterville adopted prohibition in elections that closed a county wide local option campaign Thursday. The elections were marked by great excitement. Returns from all over the county assure county-wide prohibition by probably 2,000 majority. This will leave Joplin the only "wet" spot in Jasper county.

Wise, Joe Roberts, Henry Boeck, Judge Johnson, J. P. Falter and Kelly Fox.

The casket was banked with beautiful flowers from Denver friends and neighbors. The remains were taken to the home of A. Baxter Smith, and lay in state until the hour of 10 o'clock when the funeral procession started for the cemetery.

Canon Burgess conducted the funeral services at the grave, which consisted of the impressive ceremony of the Episcopal church.

Much dissatisfaction has been expressed regarding the primary system of selecting candidates for state and county offices. A year ago the republican central committee undertook to name the candidates for county office but their plan miscarried and caused no little dissatisfaction. The Courier never has approved of the primary plan of nominating. It is a useless expense to the tax payers and does not insure us the best men for office.

Why not return to the old plan of nominating in conventions. You will say, perhaps, that until the primary law is repealed a defeated candidate at the convention would still be able to file for the office under the primary law. That is true, yet the same privilege was open to him to file by petition under the old plan. Men selected in a convention would have little to fear, however, from the candidates who were unwilling to abide by the wishes of the majority.

The Courier suggests to the republicans of Cass county that we hold a county convention, one of the good old-fashioned kind—in Louisville's new opera house. We would like to see Dr. M. M. Butler of Weeping Water, chairman of the convention; hear Bob Windham, Ex-Governor Sheldon, Congressman Pollard and others tell the old story of prosperity. We will nominate Henry Schneider for secretary and might allow A. L. Tidd to say a few words providing he will tell in advance what he intends to say and promises not to keep the boys in suspense too long.
