not great but a car loaded with prunes was almost a total loss, there being bushels of prunes scattered over the ground and mixed with sand. A wrecking crew was soon at the scene and a temporary track was built around the wreck to permit trains to pass.

While coming to town last Wednesday Jim Murphy met with an accident that he will not soon forget. He was coming down the steep hill near John Group's farm when a ring in the neck-yoke gave away and the buggy ran on to the horses. Charley Gurlach was driving just ahead of Murphy and he says the way that he came down that hill was no trouble to him whatever. On reaching the foot of the hill Murphy turned his team out of the road and in doing so the buggy was overturned. Jim was still tangled up in the wreck when Gurlach went back to assist him. Strange to say he came out without a scratch, but the buggy did not fare so well and was considerably delapidated.

There appears to be considerable difference of opinion as to the kind of bridge the B. & M. railroad intends to build over the Missouri river just below town, and various ideas have been advanced. The latest of these is that the company intends to build a short stone pier midway between the present center pier and the high pier on the Iowa side, on which will rest the ends of two iron trusses, the other ends of the two trusses resting on the present piers. The railroad track will be laid on top of these trusses, and the west span is to be left as it now is. This idea comes from a railroad source, but is hardly correct. Railroad work is usually shrouded in mystery, and that appears to be the case at present.

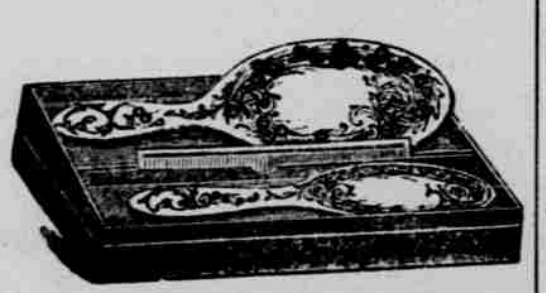
