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Death of Another Old Citizen.

The Journal is again called upon to chronicle the death of another old and highly respected citizen of Cass county, in the person of Mr. Fred Wehrlein, living about seven miles northwest of Plattsmouth, which occurred last night of Bright's disease.

The deceased came to this county in the early '70s from Wisconsin, and purchased a farm, where he has ever since resided. He was about 60 years of age, and was one of the most prominent German farmers of Cass county. A daughter, Mrs. August Gorder, resides in this city. The funeral will take place to-morrow from the residence.

Was it Suicide?

Antone Sebastia, a farm hand, died on Tuesday last, under circumstances that seemed rather suspicious, at the home of Joseph Svehla, in the west part of the city, and the facts in the case reported to Coroner Boeck, who deemed it necessary to hold an inquest. Accordingly the following jury was selected to hold an inquest over the body: B. Chrisweiser, A. L. Buzzell, J. A. Murphy, P. P. Gass, A. C. Helms and V. C. Anderson. Evidence produced showed that shortly before he died he told a friend that he had eaten the sulphur off of a box of matches, and a verdict was rendered to the effect that the deceased came to his death as the result of sulphur poisoning.

The deceased came to the home of Mr. Svehla on Wednesday of last week quite sick. He was a single man, 28 years old, and came to America six years ago, and has no relatives in this country. The funeral occurred yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock.
