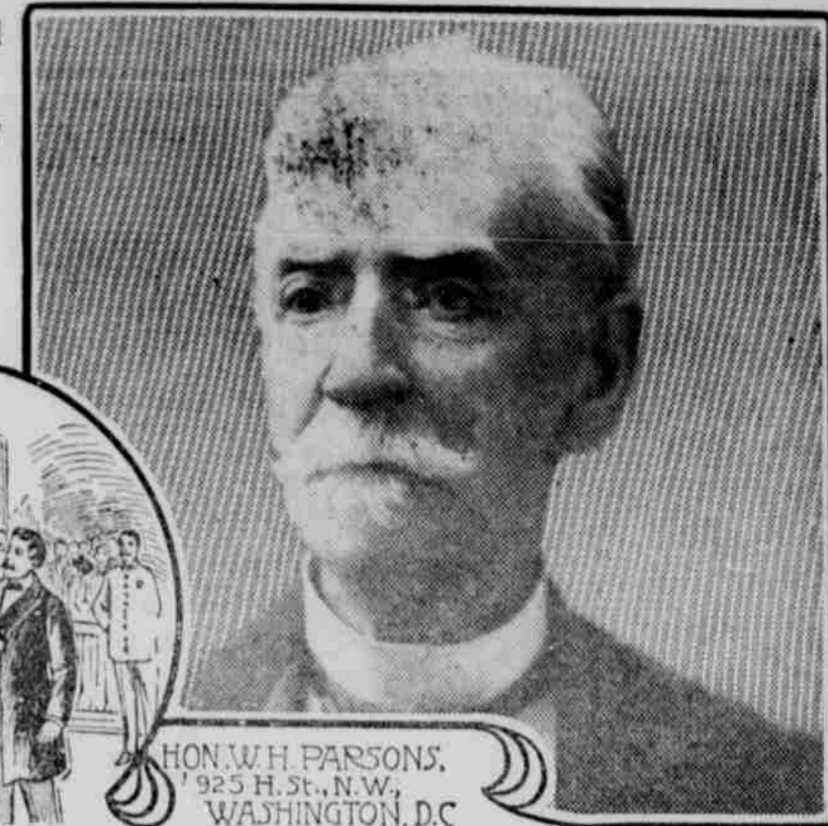

### TO IMPROVE GAS PLANT

Fifteen or Twenty Workmen to be Employed Right Away on Improvements.

The Nebraska Lighting company are arranging to greatly improve their plant during the next two months, and will employ from fifteen to twenty men until the work is entirely completed. Among the various improvements will be to put in large mains and lower the same considerably. Also to extend the same further out in various sections of the city.

The plant, although comparatively new, has not given general satisfaction, and it is the intention of the company to overhaul the whole business and thus remedy the defects. There are many people in the city who would use gas if the same was first class and up-to-date, and it is the intention of the company to expend quite a sum in an effort to make the plant second to none in the state.

Work, we understand, will be commenced immediately and pushed to
