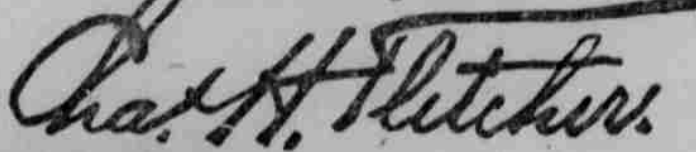

DIED IN GLENWOOD IOWA, YESTERDAY

Mrs. Sarah, Mother of Our Fellow Townsman, C. N. Schultz, Passed Away Suddenly.

From Saturday's Daily. Mrs. Sarah Shultz, mother of our townsman, Mr. C. N. Schultz, died at her home in Glenwood very suddenly Thursday night at the age of 87 years.

Mrs. Shultz was born in Pennsylvania, where she grew to womanhood and where she was married and resided for many years and until her husband, William Shultz, died, after which she came west with her sons and settled in Glenwood, Iowa, over twenty years ago.

She is survived by four sons and one sister, Alice Weber, who is married and resides at Hay Springs, Nebraska. Her sons are: C. N. Schultz of this city, H. D. of Glenwood, Iowa; J. A. of Beaconsville, Iowa, and G. O. of Des Moines.

The funeral will probably occur tomorrow at Glenwood and will be conducted by the pastor of the M. E. church of that city. Mr. C. N. Schultz returned to Glenwood this morning to aid his brother in making arrangements for the funeral.

ASHLAND DRAINAGE DISTRICT. DETAILED REPORT OF APPORTIONMENT OF UNITS OF BENEFIT AND ASSESSMENT.

State of Nebraska, Saunders and Cass Counties, ss.

To Whom It May Concern. The undersigned, President and Secretary of Ashland Drainage District, hereby certify that at a duly called meeting of the Board of Directors thereof, held at Ashland, Nebraska, on the 18th day of March, 1911, the following resolution was adopted by said Board as the Detailed Report of Apportionment of Units of Benefit and Assessment in said Ashland Drainage District:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of Ashland Drainage District, having heretofore, with the aid of the engineer chosen by them, made detailed plans of the public work to be done by said district under the terms of the law under which it is organized, and having traversed said district and carefully inspected all the various tracts of land therein with the view to making a fair and just apportionment of the units of benefit and assessment to said respective tracts according to benefit derived from said improvement, and having apportioned one unit of assessment to each of the tracts least benefited, and to each tract receiving a greater benefit a greater number of units or fraction thereof, according to the benefits received, and having met at Knights of Pythias Hall in the City of Ashland, Saunders County, Nebraska, on the fourth day of March, 1911, at the hour of ten A. M., pursuant to notice published for more than one week immediately preceding said meeting in each of the following named newspapers, to-wit: Wahoo Democrat, published at Wahoo, the county seat of Saunders County, Nebraska; Plattsmouth Journal, published at Plattsmouth, the county seat of Cass County, Nebraska; and the Ashland Gazette, published at Ashland, Saunders County, Nebraska, for the purpose of hearing all parties interested in the apportionment of benefits by reason of said drainage improvement who might desire to be heard, and having heard all suggestions, arguments and objections and evidence adduced by any and all parties interested, and being duly advised in the premises, and having made said apportionment fair and just according to benefits received from said drainage improvement, and having determined the number of units of benefit and assessment to be apportioned to each tract, as follows, to-wit:

DETAILED REPORT OF APPORTIONMENT OF UNITS OF BENEFIT AND ASSESSMENT. Description. Units of Benefit Assessment.

All real estate in Township 12, North Range 9, East of the 6th Principal Meridian, and is all located in Saunders County, Nebraska, except where otherwise stated.

(Explanation: A. Lands and lots located in Saunders County, Nebraska, and set out in detail in the Detailed Report of Apportionment of Units of Benefit and Assessment, and to which units of benefit and assessment are omitted from this published notice, which is a copy of said apportionment so far as the lands and lots located in Saunders County, Nebraska, are concerned, together with a statement of the total number of units of benefit in said district.)

And he further resolved that said Board of Directors does hereby find and declare that none of the tracts of land in said District, other than those hereinbefore enumerated and to which units of benefit and assessment are hereinbefore apportioned, will be benefited by said drainage improvement, and the units of benefit and assessment are apportioned to and against any of said non-benefitted tracts.
