

GEORGE LYTLE RECEIVES SENTENCE OF FROM TWENTY YEARS TO LIFE

Attorney for Lytle to Appeal Case to the Supreme Court and Asks That Judgment be Suspended on Prisoner, Alleging that Certain Parts of Criminal Code is Unconstitutional.

At a session of the district court yesterday Judge Travis passed sentence on George Lytle, the third man convicted of burglary by explosives of the jewelry store of Mike Tritsch at Louisville September 29th last.
Lytle was convicted by a jury on February 2, and a motion for a new trial filed within three days, and argued and submitted to the court today. Lytle was taken to the court room by the sheriff about 1:15 p. m., and after listening to his attorney, Mr. Britt, for a time, the prisoner was directed by Judge Travis to stand up, and the Judge then informed Lytle that he had been convicted by a jury after a fair trial of the crime charged in the information, and the convicted man was then asked if he had anything to say why the sentence of the court should not be passed upon him. Lytle replied that he was innocent of the crime of which he had been convicted.
The court then pronounced a similar sentence to that passed on Lytle's associates, Frank McCann and John Doud, namely, that the prisoner should be taken to the penitentiary from the court room, there to remain at hard labor, Sundays and holidays excepted, for a period of twenty

years, or during his natural life, but not less than twenty years.
Lytle's attorney then filed affidavits of poverty, alleging that defendant had no funds to meet the expense of transcript, and he desired to appeal the case to the supreme court, and moved the court to require the clerk of the court to prepare a transcript at the expense of the county. A motion in arrest of judgment was also filed setting forth that two reasons existed why the court should interfere and arrest its judgment, the first being that sections 50a and 50b of the criminal code of Nebraska were unconstitutional; the second reason was that section 50-2b of the code is unconstitutional.
The story of the crime for which Lytle and his companions were convicted is still fresh in the minds of the Journal readers, and no good purpose could be served by rehearsing it again. The entire stock of jewelry of Mr. Tritsch was taken and was never afterward recovered. The defendants had an impartial trial before a learned judge and a conscientious jury, but the chain of circumstances about the accused men was such that no reasonable man could come to any other conclusion than that reached by the jury in each case.

Socialist Meeting.
The socialists of Nebraska are expecting great gains in the party vote this year. Clyde J. Wright, the state secretary of the party, with headquarters at Lincoln, gives out the statement that in three years the party membership has increased over 500 per cent and that if a vote was to be taken now it would record close to 15,000. The socialists have started their campaign nationally through the national party machinery, with a membership of over 100,000. A national socialist lyceum bureau has been started and five circuits are at work, with five lecturers on each circuit. The state secretary says that a trainload of literature will be distributed over these five circuits. Patterned after the national lyceum bureau the state organization of Nebraska has established a two-number lyceum course. The state campaign has been opened in Nebraska and the advance lecturers are now in the field.
Plattsmouth has been given dates for the opening gun of a meeting on March 6. Clyde J. Wright, who was the recent socialist candidate for governor, will address this meeting. The affair will be held at Coates' hall at 8 p. m. This is but one of the many big meetings that will be held at Plattsmouth. Wright has just returned from a lecture trip in the southern states, where he was lecturing for the national lyceum bureau. He is considered to be one of the national lecturers of ability.
