

NOTICE OF PROPOSITION TO VOTE SPECIAL TAX.

The electors of the County of Cass, Nebraska, will take notice that at a special election to be held on the 24th day of April, A. D. 1913, at the regular voting places in all the precincts and wards throughout said county, the following question and proposition will be submitted to a vote of the people.

Shall the Board of County Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska, or other person or persons charged by law with the appropriation of money and levying of taxes for said county for the time being, appropriate the sum of \$12,000 and, in addition to the regular annual taxes, cause to be levied on all taxable property of said county, a special tax sufficient to raise said amount for the purpose of building a County Jail on the Court House grounds in the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, taking such action as the requirements of the law and the interests of the public may demand; provided that said special tax be levied at the time of making the regular levy of the general taxes for the year 1913, and be entered upon the tax list in the same manner as other taxes, and that proceedings shall be commenced for the execution of said special tax as soon as authority is obtained from the electors as is possible under the law, and be continued without unnecessary delay until the same shall have been completely and provided that said special tax be levied and collected one year and one year only.

That the said question and proposition above set forth shall be submitted to the legal voters of said county in the following form and manner, that is to say the form of the ballot to be used at said election in favor of said question and proposition shall be as follows:

"I vote for the appropriation of \$12,000 and for the levy and collection of a special tax sufficient to raise said amount for the purpose of building a County Jail."

FRUIT GROWERS TO BEGIN WORK

Effective Plans to Make Apple Raising a Science in Nebraska.

President E. M. Pollard of the recently organized Fruit Growers' association, has issued the following statement concerning the work of the organization:

"The fruit growers of the state have united in the formation of the Eastern Nebraska Fruit Growers' association. By co-operation among ourselves, it is our purpose to induce fruit growers to cultivate, prune and spray their orchards and to introduce better methods of grading and packing their fruit.

"Having provided a means of placing upon the market fruit of superior quality, the central association will, through its directorate, sell the fruit grown by its members. This fruit will be sold under the association brand, which we propose shall be an absolute guarantee as to quality and grade. We wish to adopt a trade-mark that will signify superior quality.

"At national apple shows and at expositions held during the past thirty years apples grown in eastern Nebraska, when placed in competition with apples exhibited from different parts of the United States, have proved that from the standpoint of quality measured in flavor or longevity, they are equal if not superior to apples grown anywhere in the world.

"We desire a trade-mark that will of itself signify fruit of the highest quality. The board of directors of the Eastern Nebraska Fruit Growers' association offer as a prize \$10 to the person that will submit to the secretary of the association, Mr. Val Keyser of Fairbury, the best symbol or emblem that will come the nearest representing quality of the highest order when applied to fruit. The board of directors reserve the right to withhold the award of the prize if, in their judgment, none of the suggestions for a trade-mark are sufficiently suggestive to warrant their adoption. All suggestions must be filed with the secretary on or before April 5, 1913. "Ernest M. Pollard."
