DR. A. E. WALKER IS FOUND DEAD

Supposed to Have Committed Suicide Some Time Last Night
Details are Lacking

The news of the death of Dr. A. E. Walker was telephoned to this city this afternoon about 5:30 from Union, where the doctor has been engaged in the practice of medicine. The doctor had not been noticed around the village during the day, and some of his friends went to the office about 4:30 to see if there was any word left, and on entering the back room they were horrified to find the body of the unfortunate still in death, having been shot through the right temple, the bullet passing clear through the head. It is not known whether it was suicide or not, as the parties finding the body did not touch any of the effects in the room, waiting until the arrival of the sheriff and county attorney. There was an open note-book lying on the table and this may offer some clue to the cause for the crime. The doctor was of a very jovial disposition and has never shown any inclination to commit suicide.
