## REAL ESTATE BELONGING TO THE HALMES ESTATE SOLD

The sale of the real estate belonging to the estate of the late Nicholas Halmes was held this morning at the south door of the court house by D. O. Dwyer, attorney for the estate. There was quite a large crowd in attendance at the sale, as the Halmes farm, west of this city, is one of the choicest in this part of the county, and was bid in by Peter Halmes, a son, for some \$34,000, or about \$125 an acre. The fact that the heirs could step in at any time under the will and take the bid kept a good many from offering bids for the property. The 80-acre farm near Greenwood was also bought by Peter Halmes for \$7,000. The town property was bought by G. P. Eastwood, subject to the life interest of the widow. This sale will settle up the real property of the estate and put it where the division can be made and the administrator get the matter off his hands. Mr. Nicholas Halmes came here at an early day, and recognizing the opportunity presented, secured all the land he could, and although he was forced to undergo years of hardship, he leaves his children well provided for.
