THOSE SEEKING NATU-
RALIZATION PAPERS**

The naturalization department
of the district clerk's office has
received notice from the depart-
ment of labor at Washington
that on and after September 27
all declarations of intention to
become citizens declared before
the new law went into effect in
1906, are void and parties not
making their application for sec-
ond papers before September 27,
will be compelled to secure new
first papers before they can vote
or be allowed to procure their
second papers. A great many have
been neglected to file for their
second papers, and if they are not
careful will be compelled to go
clear through the process of
making application before they
can secure their citizenship
papers.
