TO BECOME CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES

Those Who Desire to Do So Should Make Application to Become Citizens at Once.

The naturalization department of the office of the clerk of the district court has in the past week received one application for first papers from Joseph Dietel, living near this city, who came to this country from Germany on October 23, 1904, and has resided here since that time.

Herman Weiss also made application for his second citizenship papers, having arrived in this country on May 1, 1906, and having made his declaration desires to become a full-fledged citizen of the United States and to foreswear all allegiance to the emperor of Germany.

The parties who made their declaration of intention to become citizens before the act of 1906 became effective in regard to this matter should take heed of the notice that has been sent out by the department of labor at Washington that after September 27, 1913, all first papers made before the act of 1906 was passed will become outlawed and it will be necessary for the parties who wait until after September 27 to make out new declarations before they will even be allowed to vote in this country.
