## NUMBER OF RAILROAD ACCIDENTS IN COUNTY

The following figures in regard to the fatalities and injuries on railroads will be interesting to the readers of the Journal, as it shows the appalling number of accidents which occur. In the matter of fatal accidents the Burlington is more fortunate than most of the roads, as their percentage of fatalities is very low.

Defective roadway and defective equipment, jointly, caused more than 70 per cent of all the derailments of steam railroads of the United States during the quarter ended March 31, last, according to statistics announced today by the interstate commerce commission. Of derailments due to defective roadway, more than 29 per cent were caused by broken rails.

During the quarter 158 persons were killed and 3,925 were injured in train accidents, these figures showing a decrease of 109 killed and 1,157 injured, as compared with those for the corresponding period of 1912.

In other train accidents, including accidents to employees while at work, to passengers getting on and off cars, and to trespassers, 2,086 persons were killed and 17,194 injured, showing a decrease of 30 killed and increase of 1,480 injured.

By industrial accidents not involved in train operations, but occurring to railway employees on railway premises, 27 were killed and 25,812 injured, a decrease of one killed and an increase of 7,826 injured.

The total shows a decrease of 110 killed and an increase of 1,159 injured, as compared with the corresponding quarter of last year.

## TWO BOX CARS ARE DESTROYED BY FIRE NEAR THE PUMP HOUSE

This noon the woods along the Burlington condemned track just south of the pumping station caught fire and in a few minutes the flames had gained great headway and spread to two box cars that were standing on the track, and in a short time one of the cars was totally destroyed, while the other was burnt in bad shape. The flames, traveling through the dry woods and grass, spread rapidly and but for the work of the switch crew, who came to the scene on the switch engine, the whole string of cars would have been gutted by the flames. A number of men from the shops were called out and had their efforts toward subduing the flames. The extreme dry weather has made everything so dry that the least spark is apt to set a fire and it is to be feared that the woods near their places should have had that they are looked after before serious fire results as a consequence. The cars that were destroyed by the fire were fortunately condemned ones and worthless except for scrapping purposes, so that the loss to the railroad will not be much. For the past few days several boys have been caught setting fires in the vicinity of the pump house, and it is not known whether this fire was caused in the same way or not.
