### PLATTSMOUTH SHOULD HAVE FREE MAIL DELIVERY BY CARRIERS

What is the matter with attempting to secure free city mail delivery for the city of Plattsmouth? There are a number of the smaller towns of the state that enjoy this privilege and there is no real reason why this city should not be added to the list of Nebraska cities that has the government free delivery system. The walks throughout the city are in good shape and this has in the past been one of the main reasons why the city delivery was not established here before now, as the government is very insistent upon there being good walks over which the carriers can travel on their routes to distribute the mail. Many of the smaller towns of this section of the state have been promised the installation of a free carrier system and there is little doubt that if the proper effort was made that such service could be secured here if the service of the congressmen and senators from this state could be enlisted in the matter, and the matter of getting up a petition to cover the work of installing the carrier system should be agitated by the business men and citizens in general.

### IMPORTANT ACTIONS IN DISTRICT COURT

From Saturday's Daily.  
The case of C. Lawrence Stull vs the C. B. & Q. railroad was argued and submitted to the jury yesterday about noon, and the jury were turned over to the custody of the sheriff to deliberate over the matter as to the rights in the case, which, as stated yesterday, was a suit for damages for the alleged burning of several hay stacks and the killing of a heifer calf. The amount of damages asked was \$550. The jury was out on the case until a little after 9 o'clock last evening, when they returned a verdict giving the plaintiff damages in the sum of \$240. The case was quite warmly contested on both sides and a large number of witnesses were examined for both the plaintiff and defendant.

Judge Begley has set aside the last two days of next week for holding court in this city, but if the case scheduled, that of the Manley Co-Operative Grain company vs. the M. P. railroad, is settled, as seems possible, he will devote the entire week to holding court at Nebraska City, as the docket here has been well worked over.

In the case of I. M. Ward vs. James McCartney, which was decided in favor of the plaintiff a few days ago, the motion for a new trial, raised by the defense, was overruled by the court.

In the matter of the Costilla Estates Development Co. vs. John Tighe, the defendant was given thirty days in which to answer, as was also the case of the Boston Safe Deposit Co. vs. John Tighe. This case is over a number of notes which the plaintiff land company has sold, it is alleged in their petition, to the trust company.

The case of T. H. Pollock vs. John Sattler, et al., a suit to have certain lands of the plaintiff declared outside of the city limits of Plattsmouth, was decided by Judge Begley in favor of the plaintiff and the lands placed outside of the city limits. The firm of Rawls & Robertson was the attorneys for the plaintiff, while the city was represented by City Attorney Tidd.

In the case of Amelia Sherwood vs. Robert W. Sherwood, sr., the clerk of the district court was ordered to pay to the plaintiff personally, all monies in his possession, less her costs incurred. Judge Begley also granted a decree in the divorce case of Mollie L. Viall vs. Robert H. Viall, allowing the plaintiff her freedom on the grounds of extreme cruelty.
