M., and & came to the Home here to reside on March 11, 1909, and had since resided here, where he had made a great many friends, as he was a very pleasant old gentleman, and despite his great burden of years and the infirmities that the hand of time had laid on him, his mental faculties were very bright and it was always a pleasure to meet and converse with him. In his death the members of the Home feel they have lost a dear, kind friend, and his passing will be sincerely regretted by all who

knew this kindly old gentleman. The funeral was held this afternoon at 2:30 at the Home, under the charge of Plattsmouth sermon being delivered by Rev. F. M. Druliner of the First Methodist church of this city, and the body was tenderly borne to its final resting place in beautifu!
