**THE COUNCIL
HOLDS INTEREST-
ING MEETING**

**A Great Deal of Curbing Planned
and Considerable Permanent
Sidewalk Will Be Put In.**

Last evening the faithful members of the city council, despite the hot and stifling atmosphere of the council chamber, assembled for their regular semi-monthly meeting, and there was not an absentee when the mayor rapped for order.

The council received a communication from Attorney W. A. Robertson in which he asked permission of the city council to curb the south side of Courtland street to connect with the curbing in district No. 5, the curb to extend along lots No. 1 and 2, in block 9, White's addition to Plattsmouth city. The permission prayed for was granted and the petitioner authorized to go ahead and have his work done.

In regard to the matter of the new pool hall which has been proposed to open in the Hotel Riley block, W. W. Rouse of Clarinda, Iowa, presented a request to the council that he be allowed to open such a place at once, and as the customary fee of \$50 was included with his application the desired permission was granted.

The Monarch Engineering Co., through their foreman, O. K. Reed, informed the council that the work on the county's concrete culvert at the foot of Wintersteen Hill had been completed and that it was desired to remove the old steel bridge by June 17, and they desired very much to have the city make the fill at that place. The matter will be looked after at once, as the mayor informed the council they were engaged in negotiations with the Burlington to secure material to fill with.

The final estimate on the North Sixth street curbing was submitted by the city engineers, Bruce & Standeven, and showed the cost of the work to be \$504.24, and they recommended the payment of the sum due the contractor, with the exception of the usual per cent held to protect the city.

Chief of Police Ben Rainey, for the month of May, reported to the council eleven arrests.

City Clerk Nemetz, during the month just closed collected the sum of \$39.50 from various sources, which he has added to the city treasury to aid in running the city government.

The report of City Treasurer Soennichsen showed that the city had a balance of \$12,302.77 on hand at present in the different funds of the city. It was decided by the finance committee of the council that it would be well to transfer some of the funds in the business tax fund to the general fund, as the license money was all in the business fund, and a resolution to this effect was accordingly passed unanimously by the councilmen.

Councilman Lushinsky desired to know what had been done in regard to the examination of the books of the park commissioners, and Councilman Patterson informed the council that while they had been notified that the books were ready to be transferred over to the finance committee for examination, it had been impossible to find the custodian in his office, so that they could be worked on.

The ordinance re-locating and establishing the curb line on North Third street and on Vine street from the east side of Fourth street to the west side of Vine street, was placed on its final reading, and on motion of Patterson the rules were suspended and the ordinance placed on its second and third reading and passed and will take effect at once after its publication. This was done in order to hurry the work in the curbing and gutting in this district, which will be gotten under way as soon as possible.

The streets, alleys and bridges committee reported back to the council that they had examined the bids for the curbing and gutting in district No. 6 and found that James Burnie was the lowest bidder and recommended that the contract be let to him, as he had presented a bond to protect the city from loss in the work. The recommendation of the committee was accepted.

Councilman Hallstrom inform-

ed the council that the water mains on Rock street were not of sufficient depth in the ground, as a heavy rain would expose them, and he desired the water company be notified to look after this during the coming summer, when the work could be done. The other councilmen seemed to think that it was the risk of the water company to attend to this, as it was to their interest to see that the mains were lowered, and no action was taken in the matter.

A petition was presented from R. B. Hayes and Mrs. Augusta Martens asking that the curb line be established and grading done at lots 1 and 2 and 14 and 12, in block 52, in order that the property owners could place in permanent walks at once. On motion of Councilman Lushinsky the petition was granted and the work ordered done at once.

The finance committee, after consideration of the following claims against the city recommended that they be paid: Ben Rainey, salary, \$75; Frank Newman, salary, \$65; John Fitzpatrick, salary, \$20; M. Archer, salary, \$30; Weyrich & Hadraba, supplies, \$1.88; Lincoln Telephone Co., rent and tolls, \$2.65; Nebraska Lighting Co., light at city hall 50 cents, street lights, \$1.29; Albert Jones, street work, \$18.80; Alvin Jones, same, \$18.80; John Swanson, same, \$18.60; Mural Parmele, street sprinkling, \$38.40; Mike Lutz, street commissioner, \$33; Walter Trumphon, street work \$31.40; D. B. Ebersole, rods for surveyor, \$2.40; Bruce & Standeven, extra work, 50c; A. L. Tidd, filing answer, Water Co. vs. City, \$2.75; Western Stamp & Stencil Co., 50 dog tags, \$2; William Gravitt, extra police, \$6; I. N. Cummings, burying five dogs, \$2.50; Warga & Schuldice, three bubbling drinking cups and labor, \$12.75; Edward Svoboda, work at cemetery, \$20.20; Ed Kalasek, same, \$6.60; William Hiner, same, \$22.60; Dr. O. Sandin, nozzle man, \$1.50; Gus Kopp, same, \$1.50; Gus Carlson, same, \$1.50; William Grebe, same, \$1.50; C. B. & O. R. R., two steel plates, \$25.60; Mike Mauzy, inspecting curbing, \$30; Charles McBride, street work, \$16; S. G. Stone, same, \$27.50; W. A. Tompkins, same, \$28.

Councilman Patterson called the attention of the council to the fact that several parties in the north part of the city desired to place in permanent walks and they would like to have grading done on the street so that the work could be done. The council was of the opinion that the parties should present a petition in writing before the grading could be ordered.

The claims committee reported back the following bills, and on motion warrants were ordered drawn for them: Nebraska Lighting Co., light for April, \$1.27; Fred Patterson, surveying, \$22; Bruce & Standeven, two extra plans and specifications, \$3.00.

After ordering considerable street work the council adjourned.
