

NOTICE OF INCORPORATION OF THE FIRST SECURITY BANK OF CEDAR CREEK.

Article 1. The name by which this corporation shall be known is First Security Bank of Cedar Creek, Nebraska.

Article 2. The principal place of business of this corporation shall be at Cedar Creek, county of Cass, State of Nebraska.

Article 3. The object for which this corporation is formed is to carry on a commercial banking business under the laws of the State of Nebraska.

Article 4. The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, of which at least Ten Thousand Dollars shall have been paid in at the time of the commencement of business, which shall be issued in shares of the par value of One Hundred (100) Dollars each.

The regular annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation shall be held on the second Tuesday of January, each year, at which meeting the board of directors above provided shall be selected. A majority of the shares of stock of the corporation at any regular or special meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article 9. Each stockholder shall at any regular or special meeting be entitled to one vote either in person or by proxy, for each share of the stock held.

Article 10. These Articles of Incorporation shall be amended at any regular or special meeting called for that purpose by a two-thirds vote of all the stock.

REGARDING THE EIGHT O'CLOCK CLOSING LAW

There has been a great deal of discussion among a great many in the last few days as to the time of the passage and approval of the daylight saloon law, or rather the 8 o'clock law, as it is better known, and for the benefit of those desiring to have information in the matter we have looked up the facts and find that the measure passed the legislature in the closing hours of the session of 1908-'09, on April 3, 1909, and this was also one of the last acts passed by the legislature, which adjourned on the same date. The law was signed by Governor Shallenberger on April 6th, and in compliance with the constitution became effective ninety days after the adjournment of the legislature, which was July 1, 1909.

COURT LECTURES BOY AND TURNS HIM OVER TO PARENTS CUSTODY

This morning in county court a young lad not yet 16 years of age was brought in from Elbowwood to answer to the charge of having taken a pistol from a residence in that place, which revolver was the property of another, and the young lad tearfully acknowledged the fact that he had entered the house, and walking through in idle curiosity had seen the revolver and had taken it. The boy was a very bright and attractive appearing lad and was apparently very regretful of the affair, as he sobbed and cried as he was told the possibilities that might be in store for him, as the penalty of his crime, and the prospects of being separated from his parents was something he greatly dreaded. The judge, after considering the matter, decided that as long as the lad behaved himself and refrained from any further acts of this kind he would be allowed to remain at home, but only on parole from the court. The lad, after a strong lecture by the court, promised that in the future he would keep out of trouble of all kinds and see that he was not brought before the court again. This was a very wise decision of the court, as the boy was not apparently bad, but had not fully realized what his actions would lead him into if they were kept up.
