The funeral of the late William Clement Sampson was held Friday afternoon at 2:30 at the Elks' lodge room and was attended by a large number of the members of the order, as well as the old friends of the family who gathered to pay their last tribute to the memory of the deceased. NEW OIL COMPANY AT SALT CREEK

The 4,880 acres of valuable oil lands on the Salt Creek dome, until lately belonging to the Parkman Oil company, and the Western Union Oil company, have been sold and conveyed to the newly organized National Petroleum company.

Owing to the European war the Frenchmen could not carry on their oil projects mentioned. The result was the formation of the new National Petroleum company and this company has now taken over the interests of all three of the French companies.

The Salt Creek dome is said to be the greatest known oil deposit of its size. It measures about seven miles by four miles. The better part of it measures about six miles by three miles. There are over seventy-five producing wells in the Salt Creek field. It is estimated that these wells will produce from 50 to 3,500 barrels apiece per day, or an average of about 500 barrels per day. The oil is the equal or superior to the Pennsylvania crude. All wells in this field flow, but most of them are capped in awaiting the determination of the question of the ownership of the lands they are upon. The present producing oil sand in this field is from 85 to 200 feet thick. Pennsylvania oil sands that are 20 to 30 feet thick are regarded first-class. —Thermopolis, (Wyo.) Independent.

NAT LEV GETS GOOD WELL IN THE GRASS CREEK FIELD

Nat Lev bought in word the first of this week that he had bought in a well in the Grass Creek field where he had been drilling on section 33 for the past three weeks. The flow was encountered in the shale at a depth of about seven hundred feet and is estimated to produce from twenty to fifty barrels of high grade oil. Mr. Lev's good fortune in getting a producer is gratifying to his numerous friends in and about Thermopolis, as well as the people whom he respects and who have already spent several thousand dollars in the development of the Hot Springs county field. —The Hot Springs county field.

On last Saturday morning a gusher of considerable proportion was brought in in the Big Elk field by the Ohio company. This is said to be the largest producer so far discovered in that field.

The Hudson Oil company now have eight producing wells within four miles of Lander, and within one-half mile of the Northwestern road tracks, near Wyopo. The company brought in their eighth well on Saturday and from indications the well is the best of the lot. It was drilled to a depth of 1,520 feet and yielded with oil, the oil spouted to a height of 300 feet and the well is 380 feet of eight-inch casing about twenty feet in the hole for all casings installed were: Past guardian, Mrs. J.
