WITHIN THE LAW IN TORPEDO USE

Frank Admission of Many Ship Sinkings, But Only After Due Warning—Doubts Sussex Was a Victim.

REPLY TO THE AMERICAN NOTE

London, April 13.—The picture of the steamer Sussex in the English paper from which productions mentioned in the German note were made, and which may have an important bearing on the note, shows that the Sussex had one smokestack, a single mast forward, flush deck and low-lying bridge, and in appearance was a typical cross-channel boat.

Berlin, April 13.—German's reply to the inquiries of the American government regarding the steamers Sussex, Manchester Engineer, Englishman, Berwindvale and Eagle Point, signed by Gottlieb von Jagow, the German minister of foreign affairs, has been forwarded to Washington by Ambassador Gerard. The note denies that the Sussex was attacked by a German submarine. The investigation covering the Sussex case says the note was extended to all actions undertaken on March 24—the day of the Sussex incident—in the channel between Folkestone and Dieppe. One steamer was sunk, the commander of the German submarine reaching the definite conclusion that it was a war vessel. A sketch of this vessel, together with photographic reproductions of a picture of the Sussex printed in the London Daily Graphic were enclosed with the note, the difference in the two craft being indicated.

Sank After Trying to Escape.

The steamers Englishman and Eagle Point were sunk by German submarines after they had attempted to escape, and time was allowed for the withdrawal of those aboard. The steamer Berwindvale was possibly sunk by a German submarine, while definite details with respect to the Manchester Engineer are lacking and therefore there has been no sufficient basis for investigation of this particular case.

The statement is made that the commanders assured themselves before sinking the ships that their destruction was justified and that the crews were safely in boats.

A Swiss passenger on the Sussex asserted to the Associated Press that he is convinced that a mine was responsible and that he so stated after the disaster. Investigating officers, he said, "bullyragged" him into changing his statement, which he now repudiates.

SUIT FILED IN DISTRICT COURT TO RECOVER ON A PROMISORY NOTE

The petition of the plaintiff further alleges that the defendant Stoll has absconded from the county and cannot be located and asks that the judgment for the \$1,550, with interest, be given, as it is alleged by the plaintiff that Stoll is attempting to dispose of his property in this county.

Schafer, a former resident of this city, was held at Glenwood where the body was brought from Graceville, Minnesota, where Mrs. Schafer has been making her home with her son, R. C. Bailey, and family since last February. Mrs. A. F. Seybert, Mrs. Elsie Hedley, a daughter of the deceased, Mrs. Dora Chase of Blair, a sister, and Edward L. Finch, a brother, departed this morning for Glenwood to attend the funeral services.

Mrs. Schafer has been making her home here for the past eight years and was well known to a large number of our people as a lady of splendid character and a true and valued friend. Mrs. Schafer was fifty-seven years of age at the time of her death and for the past year or two had not been in the best of health. Her health gradually failed until her son, R. C. Bailey, came and took her back to his home at Graceville last February and since that time she has resided where she was given the loving care of relatives.

She leaves three children to mourn her death, Mrs. Elsie Hedley of this city, R. C. Bailey and Oliver Bailey. The body was laid to rest in the Glenwood cemetery in the family lot and the services were attended by a large number of the old friends of the family in that locality.

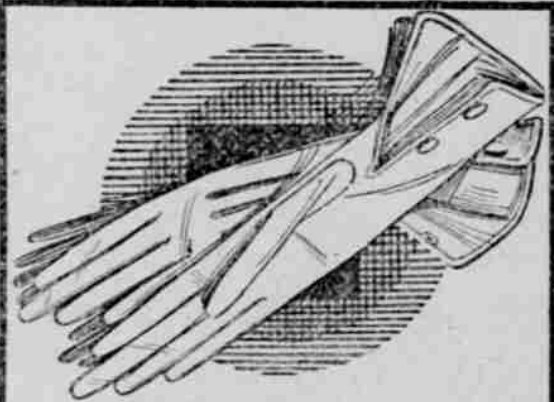
