If our offer to do so is to be rejected, aren't the people entitled to know exactly what the Government-made product costs?

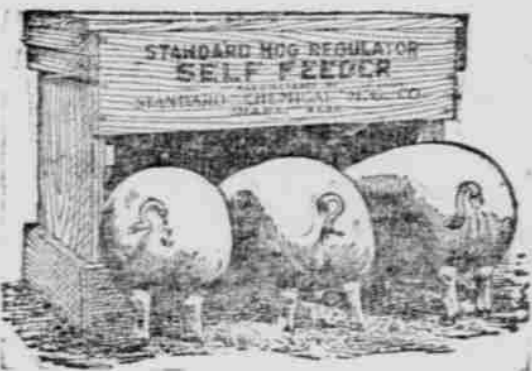
That question is now before the Senate of the United States.
