Phillip and Louis Fornoff were visitors in Plattsburgh this morning from their home near Cedar Creek and were looking after some business for the morning driving in with their car.

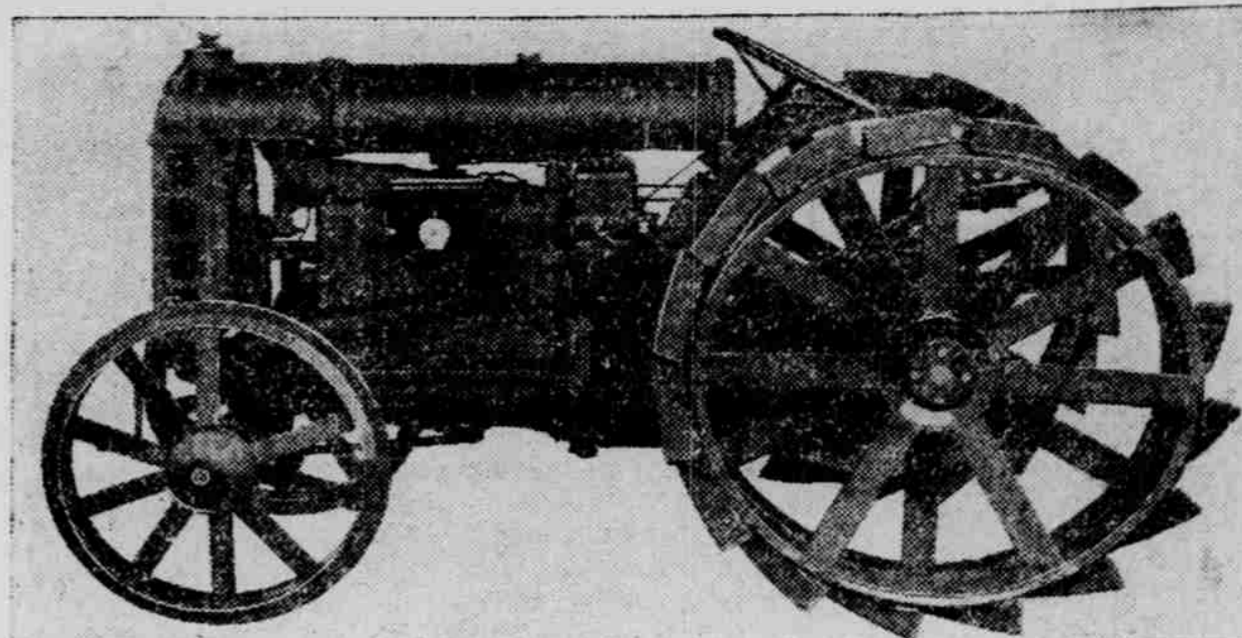
Charles Boedaker from Murray was a visitor in Plattsburgh this morning driving up in his car, to look after some business, and do some trading with the merchants, returning during the morning.
