Farmers will do well to assist him in every manner possible, for in doing so they are contributing to the development of the state, and indirectly assisting themselves.

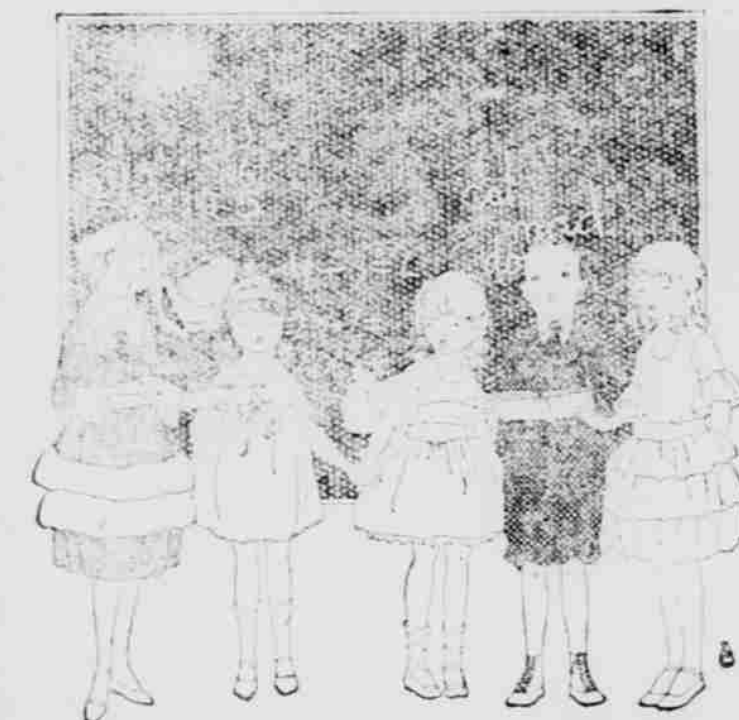

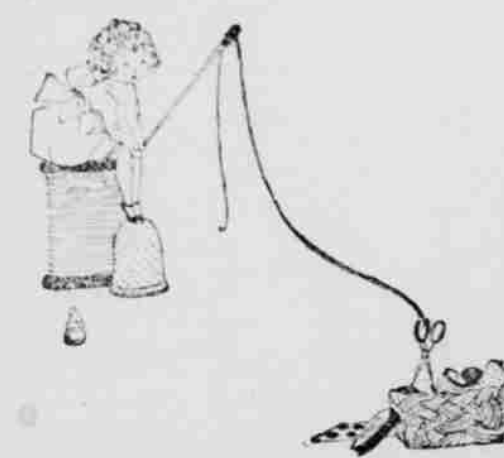
