BIG CUT IN COTTON GOODS

New York, March 10.—An unexpected revision in the prices of napped cotton for next fall was announced today by a large manufacturing concern (Amoskeag Manufacturing company), the new schedule reveals one of the most drastic single cuts known in goods of this character, declines usually taking place gradually. It was explained that the reduction was made in view of the radically changed outlook in raw cotton and the prospect of reduced production costs.

The reductions were from a basis of 37 1/2 cents a yard for daisy cloth last year, to 12 1/2 cents net, this year, and on the widely known 1921 cloth from 35 to 12 1/2 cents. These are net mill prices.
