WILL OBSERVE THE 102ND ANNIVERSARY

Patriarchs Militant of Omaha Have Arranged for Observance of the Founding of I. O. O. F.

The Patriarchs Militant of greater Omaha have announced their forthcoming observance of the 102 anniversary of the founding of the I. O. O. F. in the United States and the event promises to be one of the greatest of its kind held in the western jurisdiction of Odd-fellowship.

It has been arranged to have the speaking, music and singing from 1:30 to 3:00 in the afternoon and from 3:00 to 5:00 o'clock, the conferring of degrees or decorations on members of the order, consisting of three distinct degrees, first, the decoration of civility on five members of the Rebekah order, among whom will be included Mrs. P. D. Bates of this city; two members of the Omaha and South Omaha lodges will be decorated and the grand decoration of civility, the highest decoration of the order, will be bestowed upon a member of the order by the sovereign grand lodge of the I. O. O. F.

FARMERS APPROVE MARKETING PLAN

Only Four Votes Cast Against Measure by Delegates at Lincoln—Men for Chicago Meet

Lincoln, Neb., March 21.—Eight hundred Nebraska farmers, representing seven different farm organizations, at a big meeting here today practically unanimously voted its approval of the grain marketing plan submitted by the "committee of seventeen."

Only four votes were cast against the committee's plan. The victory for the committee came after an all-day meeting during a split in the ranks which threatened to result in a deadlock. E. M. Pollard of Nebraska was leader of the losing faction.

Delegates from Nebraska to the national ratification meeting in Chicago, April 6, which will be attended by 107 delegates from twenty-five states, were elected as follows: Farm Bureau, J. M. Norton, Polk; farmers' union, H. G. Keeney, Cowles; National Co-operative Elevator association, W. E. Dale, Lincoln; Co-operative Grain and Live Stock association, J. W. Shorthall, Omaha; Nebraska Wheat Growers' association, J. L. Hull, Holstein; delegates at large, H. C. Filley of the rural economics department of the university, and H. L. Keefe of Walthill.

Six of the delegates chosen are known to favor the marketing plan. Mr. Shorthall is the only Nebraska delegate who says he is doubtful.

U. S. PROHIBITION AIDS SPANISH WINE INDUSTRY

Washington, D. C., March 21.—During the first year of national prohibition, Malaga, Spain, shipped to the United States five times the amount of wine as in the preceding ten years, American Consul Smith says in a report received today by the department of commerce. The total wine exports to America in 1920 exceeded 475,000 gallons, the consul says, and was shipped under permits for non-beverage purposes.

Exports of raisins from Malaga to the United States in 1920 was unprecedented, the consul reports, the total being 10,300 metric tons or approximately 1,000 tons more than the total to all countries in 1919.

PACKERS' CONFERENCE IS UNDER WAY

Session of Three and a Half Hours With Unknown Result—Adjourned to Meet Tomorrow

Washington, March 21.—After spending three hours and a half in conference with Secretaries Davis, Hoover and Wallace, representatives of the five leading packers and of their union employees adjourned late today to meet tomorrow. No one would comment as to the progress of the initial efforts of the new administration in mediating a labor dispute.

Representatives of the packers and of the employees stated Secretary Davis had requested all parties to make a statement. The secretary also went on to newspaper men that he had nothing to say and announced that the discussions would be resumed tomorrow, probably at 3 p. m.

The fact that there are to be no morning conferences was taken to indicate Secretary Davis might bring the matter to the attention of President Harding and other members of the cabinet. The recess also will allow representatives of both sides to confer with their advisers. Secretary Davis remained in conference after the session with J. L. Keefe, E. P. Marsh and Howell Davis, of the labor department's board of conciliators, who sat in the conference, because they had a part in the agreement of 1919 by the packers and their employees to extend the Alschuler agreement of 1917.

The packers' representatives, Carl Meyer and J. L. Condon, were understood to have finished stating their case at 4 o'clock, having been interrupted by a few questions from employees. Whether the greater part of the remaining hour and a half was consumed by the employees was not indicated.

Secretary Davis heard the employees' side at 11 o'clock, after both sides had assembled and the meeting had been adjourned until 2 o'clock. The labor secretary, in granting a private hearing to Dennis Lane, secretary of the union, R. S. Freeman, E. P. Marsh and Howell Davis, of the labor department's board of conciliators, gave them the same privilege he had previously given Messrs. Condon and Meyer.

The full conference began at 2 o'clock with the three cabinet members, the two representatives of each side and the three members of the labor department's conciliation board present.

Unions allied with the butchers and meat-cutters set nine representatives to advise with the representatives of the employees. Prior to the joint conference J. J. Brennan, of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters and others, declared that the allied unions would stand by the other employees.

"We will not yield," he said. "If it is necessary we can make the packers stand by their agreement."

Industry and organized labor alike are watching the result of the conferences for its effect on similar agreements now in operation.

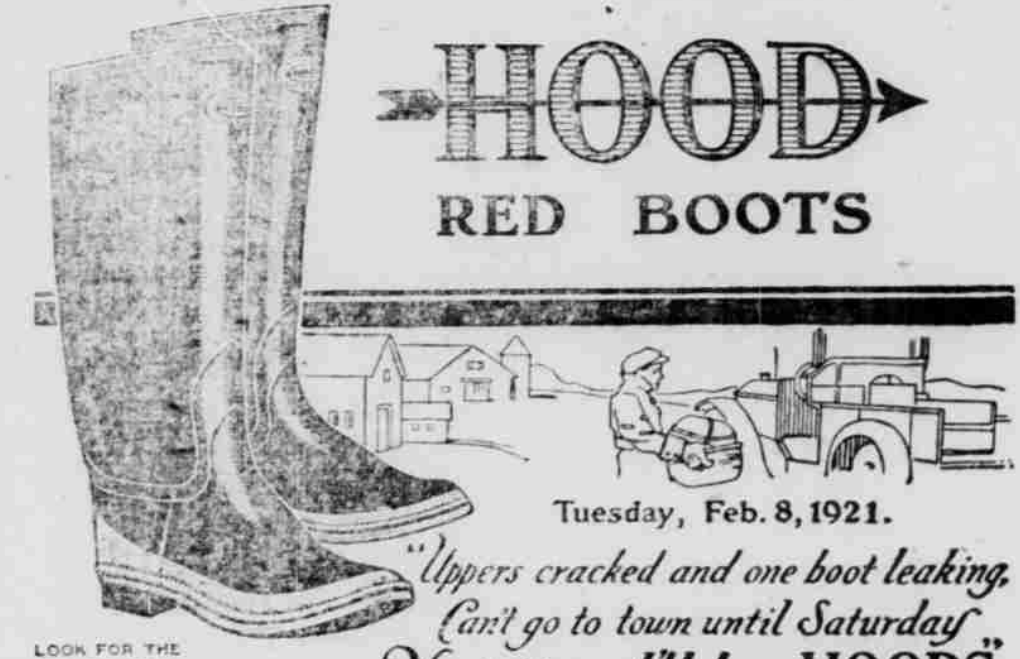

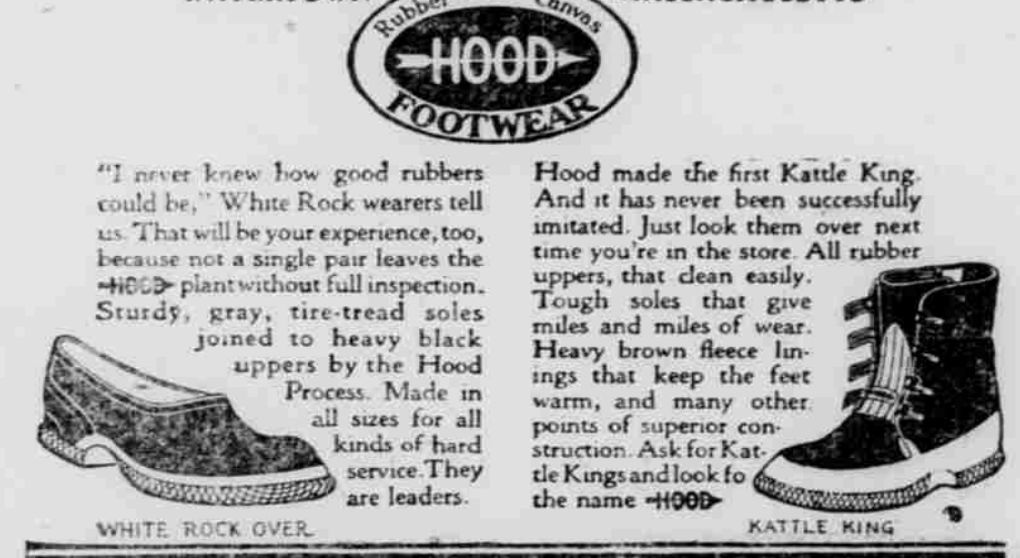
