PATRIOTIC PROGRAM VERY INSPIRING

FONTENELLE CHAPTER OF D. A. R. HAVE DELIGHTFUL ENTERTAINMENT

Last evening the ladies of Fontenelle Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution entertained the public at a patriotic program given at the parlors of the First Presbyterian Church and which was one of the most pleasing events of its kind ever given in the city.

The ladies had decided to start the proposition of a memorial tablet for the keeping of the honor roll of Cass County in the late war and the entertainment was primarily for the purpose of raising funds for this worthy cause and while the result was not perhaps as great a success as might have been hoped for, the ladies will be able to add a neat sum to the fund and with the

co-operation of the public should soon be able to secure the tablet. While the D. A. R. have taken the initiative in the matter they are glad to have anyone who desires to join in the work of securing the tablet.

The parlors of the church had been decorated with a small stage where the various tableaux were given during the course of the evening and their beauty and wonderful historical accuracy served as an inspiration for the audience. Mr. E. H. Wescott presided at the piano during the evening and furnished a large part of the delightful musical selections that formed a part of the tableaux. The opening showing of the historical scenes was that of the famous Indian princess, Pocahontas, who has been one of the notable figures of the colonial settlement of Virginia, and the role was taken by Miss Clara Mae Morgan, who made a most charming princess. Mrs. E. H. Wescott sang for this tableau, "The Waters of Forgetfulness," the accompaniment being played by Mr. Wescott.

As "Priscilla," the Puritan maiden, Miss Adice Pollock presented a very pretty picture as she was shown, seated beside an old spinning wheel, and to this picture Mrs. James T. Begley sang "The Spinning Song," being accompanied on the piano by Miss Catherine Waddick.

In the role of "Evangeline" the heroine of Longfellow's story of the banishment of the Acadians, Miss Catherine Waddick presented one of the most winsome of figures and for her offering Mrs. Mae S. Morgan sang "Looking Back."

A group of Puritan girls in costume composed of Ursula Herold, Elizabeth Waddick, and Catherine McMaken were shown seated around the old fashioned tea table and Miss Violet Begley sang a song of the early colonial period, the accompaniment being offered by Mrs. James T. Begley.

One of the best known figures of the revolutionary period, "Mollie Pitcher" was represented by Miss Minnie Archer, in a striking manner and the brave American Miss who had inspired the troops of the new republic was very realistically presented by Miss Archer. For this picture a quartet composed of Mrs. E. H. Wescott, Mrs. Mae S. Morgan, Rev. W. G. McClusky and Rev. A. V. Hunter sang "America." PENNSYLVANIA WORKERS AGREE TO CUT IN WAGES

Pittsburg, Pa., April 5.—Agreement by the company association of workers to accept a "just and reasonable wage reduction" and decision by representatives of the unionized shop workers to consider the question and answer later, was the result of a wage reduction conference here today between the managers committee of the Pennsylvania railroad and delegates for the shop crafts.

The company officials proposed wage reductions approximating 22 percent for the 44,000 shop crafts employees, which would bring the present rate of 85 cents an hour to 66 cents an hour.

The next wage conference will be held Wednesday when the managers committee meets with representatives of telegraphers, telephone operators, levermen and others.
