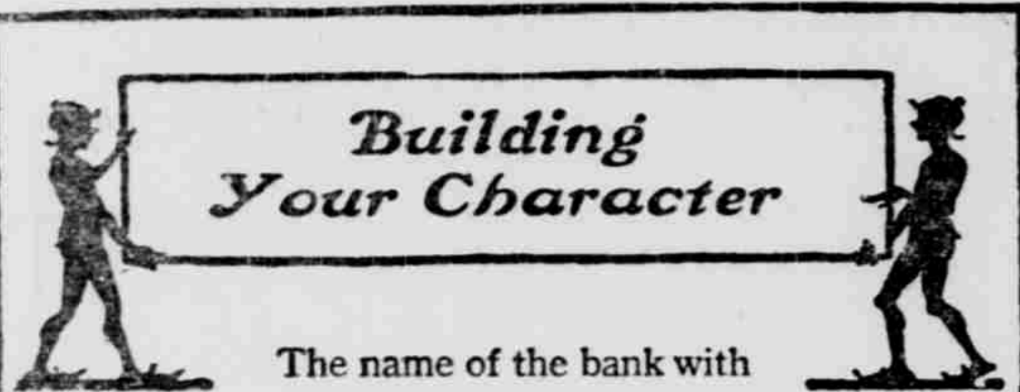

**HARDING OPENS WAY TO DISARMAMENT**  
Invites World Powers to Conference in Washington—May Pave the Way to Disarmament.

Washington, July 10.—President Harding has taken definite steps looking to a conference in Washington of the principal allied and associated powers to discuss limitation of armaments. He also has suggested that the interested nations that there be at the same time a discussion of Pacific and far eastern problems with a view to reaching a common understanding. The president furthermore has suggested that subjects relating thereto be considered at the same conference at which it is proposed that limitation of armaments be discussed.

These announcements were embodied in a statement issued tonight by the state department "by direction of the president."

Proposals for a conference on world disarmament were made in Congress some months ago, and a resolution by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, asking the president to invite Great Britain and Japan to confer with the United States on this question, has been made a part of the naval appropriation bill and accepted both by the senate and the house.

The president, however, apparently has gone much further than the suggestion in the Borah resolution. His inquiries have been addressed to France and Italy as well, and there is nothing in the state department announcement tonight to suggest the limitation of armaments be confined solely to naval construction.

Senator Borah said tonight that he preferred to withhold comment on the state department announcement until he had an opportunity to study it more closely.

**PEACE BILL COPY IS GIVEN GERMANS**  
Berlin, July 10.—Ellis Loring Dresel, United States commissioner in Berlin Saturday communicated to the German foreign office an unofficial copy of the compromise Porter-Knox resolution ending the state of war between Germany and the United States.

This copy was the first detailed information received by the Berlin government concerning the action of the United States. Active official negotiations are now being carried on between the American commission and the German foreign office concerning a final peace treaty.

The reichstag adjourned before the full text of the resolution was received, consequently the document was not submitted to the foreign affairs committee.

But the committee will probably be called together as the negotiations progress.

New York, July 10.—The princess Fatima, Sultana of Kabul, who has arrived here from San Francisco, on the way to England with her three sons, expects to visit Washington next week to pay her respects to President Harding.

An immense white sapphire, set in the left side of her nose, has attracted attention at the hotel on Fifth avenue, where the family is staying.

Prince Mohammed Hashim Khan and Prince Mohammed Azim Khan intend to enter Oxford. Twelve-year old Prince Mohammed Akbar Khan will study at Eton, Harrow or Rugby. The sultana is a first cousin of the emir of Afghanistan. She has been giving her sons education by travel since last spring. They visited China and Japan before crossing the Pacific, and will sail for England on July 15.

Chicago, Ill., July 10.—Co-ordination of state units looking toward a "solid west" at the annual convention of the American Legion at Kansas City this fall, and discussion of soldier legislation pending in congress, will be taken up at the meeting of the Mississippi valley department of the American Legion here tomorrow.

Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa were represented at a preliminary meeting today.
