The president is awaiting an official report on the events in the Herrin field which he is said to expect shortly. Labor department agents have been in constant touch with strike developments since April when the miners walked out in all union fields.

Efforts to bring about desired setlement would be made along the lines of getting the mine operators and the miners' union representatives into a joint gathering, Secretary Davis indicated. The miners' leaders, however, have

countered in the informal negotiations with a proposal to meet in a national conference fixing wages at one time for all fields or attempting the task. The in union territory have, in public, held out steadfastly for a series of district and states conferences of any kind.

Mr. Davis has had several special assistants interviewing individuals on both sides, endeavoring to find a common ground for a meeting. The present prospects that this could be done were said to be some weeks.
