### Would Mean Big Deficit

The 'living wage' idea presented berry decision makes it unnecessary to the labor board, called for a 72 to 75 cents per hour minimum for common labor all over the United States. and the maintenance of proper dif- election. ferentials for skilled labor. On the basis of the railway income for 1921, this would have created a railway deficit of \$2,211,639,518.

"A 'living wage' is not the thing for which the theorists contend. They want the 'living wage,' which, according to their dogmatic formula, means, at their lowest estimate, about \$1,650 per year for a section man. The budget upon which this wage was predicated was declared by two of the expert representatives of the employes to be a 'guess and a makeshift, and yet the board was \$15,000. criticized for not adopting it. A wage scale built on that basis for all industries, would exceed the total income of the United States by multiplied billions of dollars.
