FIRE DESTROYS A FINE HOME AT NEHAWKA TODAY

Residence of J. M. Palmer Swept by Fire this Afternoon and will be a Heavy Loss.

From Monday's Issue.
One of the most serious fires that has visited the vicinity of Nehawka this afternoon destroyed the fine, modern home of J. M. Palmer, valued at \$15,000 and with insurance estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

The fire originated in the basement of the house and had gained a strong headway when discovered and spread very rapidly through the building and despite the fact that almost the entire population of the town turned out to assist in the work
