## LINCOLN 'DADS' DENY REFORMS ARE BRYAN'S

Accept His Resignation but Credit Him Only with the Municipal Coal Yard Scheme.

Lincoln, Dec. 18.—The four members of the Lincoln city commission, in accepting the resignation today of Commissioner Charles W. Bryan, governor-elect of Nebraska spread on the records a signed statement denying Mr. Bryan's assertion in his resolution that he had himself accomplished the reforms he credited himself with in his resignation.

The commissioners who accepted the resignation were George Dayton, William Schroeder, John Wright and Mayor F. C. Zehring.

They denied that Mr. Bryan had brought about gas rate reductions, that he was a member of the commission when it voted to extend the municipal light plant, or that he was elected mayor and denied the majority appointment by the commission.

They say the charter made no provision for the election of mayor, although he ran on a slate that contemplated his appointment in such capacity.

They did credit him with the municipal coal yard, but denied that his recent reduction of \$1 a ton in the retail price was warranted by a like reduction at the mine.

Mr. Bryan in his resignation has forecast an active part in the April city election in the interest of the continuation of his municipal reforms.
