O'BRIEN SALARY

Attorney General's Office Rules Fish Commissioner is Entitled to \$1,200 in Back Pay.

Lincoln, May 17.-W. J. O'Brien uperintendent of the state fish hatchery at Gretna is legally entitled to the \$1,200 claim for back pay alowed him by the legislature, according to an opinion by Assistant Attorney General George W. Ayers presented to State Auditor George W. Marsh.

"That means the end of the controversy, so far as I am concerned. Mr. O'Brien will get his money,"

The \$1,200 represents the difference in actual cash paid O'Brien during the last four years and the ap-propriation set aside for his salary. The legislature four years ago set aside \$2,400 annually for O'Brien, while the secretary of agriculture under whom O'Brien worked paid him


