DEATH CALLS MRS. WALKER AT NOON HOUR

OLD RESIDENT OF COUNTY AND GREATLY BELOVED LADY PASSES AWAY TODAY

SUFFERED STROKE ON DEC. 23

Had Lived in Cass County Since the Year 1865—Married at Rock Bluffs in Year 1867.

From Saturday's Daily—At 12:30 today, Mrs. James A. Walker, one of the pioneer residents of Cass county, was called to her last reward, death coming after two weeks illness when she lay practically unconscious following a paralytic stroke on Sunday, December 23rd. During this time all that loving hands or skill could do was employed to ease the last hours of this beloved lady, but without avail and each day saw less and less of the strength of the patient, as she gradually sank into the everlasting sleep.

The life of Mrs. Walker has been a part of the history of Cass county, as she came here in 1865 from her home in the southland and has since made her home here, where her husband was a pioneer merchant and business man and there was hardly a resident of the eastern portion of Cass county who did not know and love this estimable lady for her many wonderful attributes that endeared her to all.

Anna Simpson was a native of Pike county, Tennessee, and was born on January 6, 1842, and grew to womanhood in that section of the south, later coming to Nebraska in the days following the Civil war and the family settled at Rock Bluffs, then the metropolis of the river towns of the territory of Nebraska, and it was here in 1867 that she was united in marriage to Mr. James A. Walker, who also had recently come to the west and located at Rock Bluffs, where he engaged in business and for years the family were among the prominent figures in that locality.

Later, when the town of Murray was established, they became residents there and the homestead at the outskirts of the city has been for years one of the hospitable homes of the county and where Mr. and Mrs. Walker delighted to receive and entertain their friends with the southern hospitality for which they were noted.

There is left to mourn the calling of this good woman, two daughters, Mrs. G. H. Gilmore and Miss Margie Walker, both of Murray. There also remain two grandsons, Walker and John Gilmore, to share the grief that the death has brought. Mrs. Walker leaves of her own family one brother residing in Kentucky and one sister in California.

There have been no funeral arrangements made as yet the messages from Murray state.

ROCK ISLAND TAX CUT WILL MEAN A LOSS TO SCHOOLS

Railroad Line Operates Thru Four of the Precincts of County—Valuations of Railroad.

From Thursday's Daily—The decision of the state supreme court reducing the valuation of the Rock Island railroad in the state will make some difference in four of the Cass county precincts, South Bend, Elmwood, Greenwood and Tipton, and especially to the school districts thru which the Rock Island line runs. The reduction in valuation will be one-fourth.

In this county in the school districts the valuations of the railroad as certified to the state board of equalization was as follows:
No. 43 \$104,623.
No. 44 78,624.
No. 57 61,777.
No. 86 25,927.
No. 102 184,309.
No. 104 136,827.
No. C-7 297,141.

These figures as to the railroad valuation have been added to the other real and personal property and from the total the levy for the taxes for the year were figured by the board of equalization and the decision of the court will mean that the revenue for the year will be considerably less than was estimated if the action of the state court is approved by the higher court to which the case will be appealed by the state tax authorities.

C. H. SLOAN ANNOUNCES WILL RUN FOR U. S. SENATOR

Railway Commissioners Elect Lincoln Man as Presiding Officer For the Year.

From Friday's Daily—Thorpe A. Browne, member of the state railway commission from Lincoln, was elected chairman for the year 1924 at the annual meeting of that body Thursday morning. He succeeds H. G. Taylor, who is serving his twelfth year as a member. Mr. Browne was a former member of the State Journal staff, and some seven years ago became secretary of the commission. When commissioner Wilson resigned in 1919, Governor McVie appointed Mr. Browne to the vacancy, because of his familiarity with the work and his unusual fitness for the position.

Mr. Browne was elected for six years at the election in 1920. He has represented the commission at a number of very important rate hearings and has written a large number of opinions during his term of service. He is recognized by traffic men as an adept in a work that requires analytical powers of an unusual character and the ability to weigh conflicting evidence.
