TAX OVER PAYMENTS TO BE REFUNDED SOON
From Thursday's Daily—
Nebraskans who overpaid the government when they paid their income taxes in advance and previous to the enactment of the revenue act of 1924, whereby a reduction of 25 per cent was effected on thousands of small incomes, will all have their money back within the next few days, according to an announcement made Wednesday by A. B. Allen internal revenue collector for Nebraska.

Twenty thousand checks had been mailed to taxpayers up until yesterday, Allen stated, and the remaining 35 hundred will probably be mailed today.

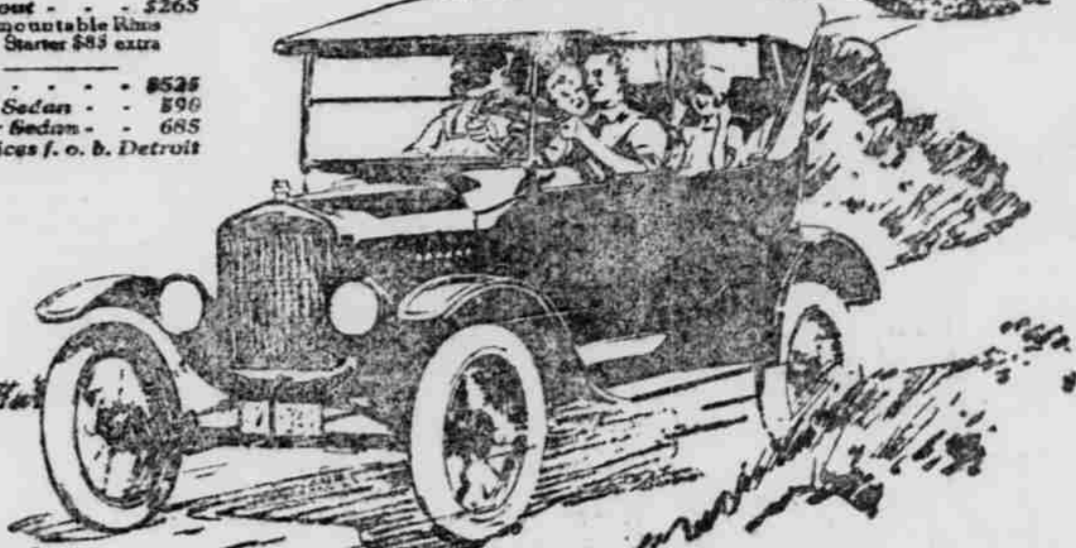
