PASSING OF AN- OTHER LONG TIME RESIDENT HERE

Ignac Vostrejs Passed Away Yesterday Afternoon in Omaha at Age of 83 Years.

Yesterday afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom C. Janda, 1308 Cumings street, Omaha, occurred the death of Ignac Vostrejs, former aged resident of this city, who at the ripe age of eighty-three years laid aside the burden of his years to enter into everlasting rest. The death was not unexpected as Mr. Vostrejs had been in very poor health for many months and had been gradually growing weaker until the call of the death messenger closed the chapter of his life. The deceased was a native of Bohemia, where he was born in July, 1841, and spent his younger years in the land of his birth, where he was married and reared a part of his family. It was in the year 1882 that the family left the familiar surroundings of their old home to cross the Atlantic and find a new home in the heart of the great west, locating the same year in Plattsmouth, where the family have since made their home. The family have been among the best residents of the city and here the aged father has lived to see the children grow to manhood and womanhood and the grandchildren come and gather at his knee and finally the great grand-children who bear his name. Six years ago the home suffered the bereavement of the taking away of the wife and mother, and since that time Mr. Vostrejs has largely made his home with the children. There are left to mourn his loss four children, Frank and Joseph, of this city; John, of Reliance, South Dakota, and Mrs. Tom C. Janda, of Omaha. Another daughter, Mrs. Josephine Krisky passed away a few months ago at her home in this city. The body of Mr. Vostrejs was brought to this city on the 2:35 Missouri Pacific and taken to the home of the son, Frank Vostrejs, where it will lay in state until the funeral which will be held Thursday morning at 10:30 on the Holy Rosary Catholic church on west Pearl street.

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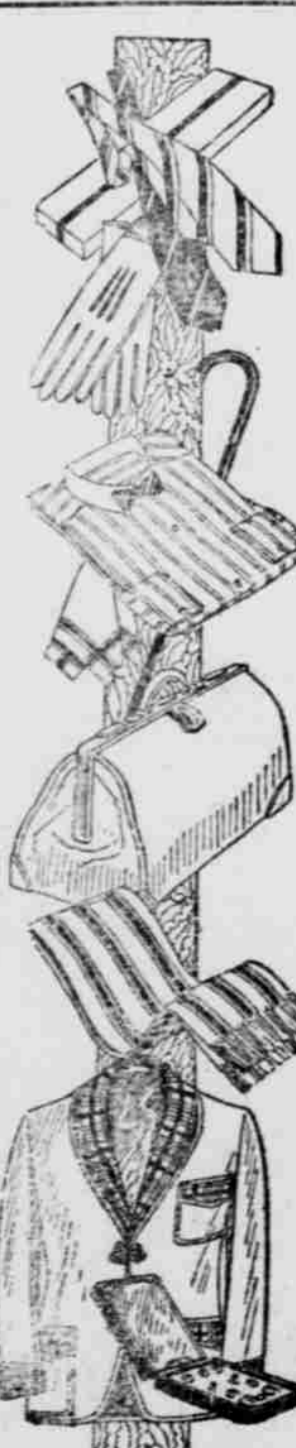
