

LOSES SIGHT OF EYE



Mr. Shrader had a particle of metal lodge in the eye and while t was removed successfully at home the wound became infected and pain ed him for several days and finally on the advice of his family he consulted a specialist in Omaha as to the injury.

The injured eye had been allowed to go too long in the infected condition and the verdict of the specialist was that the sight of the injured eve had been almost destroped and that there was very small chance of having the sight restored by a course of treatments. It is hoped by the family and friends that the injury may, after treatment, pass away, partially at least, and allow the use of the eve.


