CARING FOR RECORDS DIFFICULT PROBLEM

Loss of Documents Often Causes Heavy Expense.

New York.—The discovery in South Dakota not long ago of a parchment land deed, dated 1801 and disposing of a million acres along the Niagara river in New York state, directs attention anew to the difficulties presented by the problem of caring for records.

The matter will come to the attention of the American Historical association next December, for the society is to hold its convention at Richmond, Va., and in that city the state has a special fireproof building, the archives department of the State library, for safeguarding documents. Morgan P. Robinson, head of the archives department, was instrumental in bringing the convention to his city. In some New York towns stores of local records of historic value have been burned as junk.

The story of the archives in New York is one that has more interest than an outsider would casually attribute to such a dry-as-dust matter. It has its villains, plots, searches, clues and tense moments, extending much further back than 1817, when one villain was sentenced to prison for life for fraudulently substituting false conveyances in a record book.

It is a story not without humor also, in proof of which James P. Davenport, of the index department of the county register's office, cites the good wife of Arent Jurijsen Lautman. She flourished at a period when the earliest Dutch folio in New Amsterdam was not yet filled up.

Records From Earliest Days.

Such testimony might conceivably come to life again today. It gives a moment's glimpse at New Amsterdam, and it might be cited once more if such a dispute as the Anneke Jans claim ever got as far as a court calendar. These old claims—the assertion of families and groups that they are the true owners of this or that acreage in the heart of Manhattan—are coming up all the time, says Mr. Davenport.

Eastville, Northampton county, Virginia, has the country's oldest continuous court records, running back to 1632, and is said to have also the country's oldest will, dated July 18, 1332, and recorded on January 13 of the following year. In the custody of the New York secretary of state at Albany, however, there are Dutch land records extending from 1639 to 1649 and from 1652 to 1661. They were among the documents that escaped in the State Library fire of 1911, which destroyed 500,000 books and 300,000 manuscripts. Much of the executive, legislative and judicial record material was not in the library at the time of the fire, including Dutch, British and Revolutionary documents and state documents dating from 1777.

While the British held New York in the course of the Revolution important volumes were taken, some by Americans and some by the British, but were returned later. The English put the books on warships, and when the books were given back in 1788 they were mislabeled from their long sojourn at sea.

Only one of the original Dutch real estate "filbers" is not represented in full in the county register's files; it is the volume for 1675 to 1688. The others are represented by the originals or by abstracts.

Documents Represent Billions.

There has been considerable scattering of old New York documents. Once the secretary of the colony kept the books. Now the criminal archives are in the Court of General Sessions, the surrogate has those that belong to his work, the old Mayor's court records are held by the commissioner of records, and so on. Before 1811 deeds could be recorded locally or with the secretary of state; his office at Albany has 1,500. One old book of Dutch deeds is possessed by the New York Historical society and a translation is filed in the register's office.

Old court records outside New York city contain matter bearing on realty titles here, but a tally has shown that the city departments have all the documents listed in an inventory made by the common council in 1740.

The 11,000 folios on the shelves in the offices of Register Annie Mathews form evidence of title to \$6,000,000,000 worth of realty in Manhattan. The cost of merely gathering abstracts if such records are destroyed is tremendous. Chicagoans have spent millions of dollars for abstracts as a result of the fire of 1871, and the destruction of records in San Francisco in 1906 is said to have cost \$3,000,000 in proceedings under a special title law, aside from the cost of records in probate matters and civil and criminal actions.

Bars Radio From Russia

Moscow.—Russia is one of the few countries of the world where "radio" sets in the home are scarcely known. In all the 8,000,000 square miles of Russian territory, with a population of 100,000,000, it would be difficult to find more than a dozen amateur receiving outfits.

This is due to the nonmanufacture of home wireless apparatus in Russia; to the prohibitive duty on imported sets; to the Russian peasant's ignorance of what wireless means, and to the reluctance of the Soviet government to permit the indiscriminate use of radio apparatus, which might be used for espionage purposes.
