#### MEDICAL MEN AND THE PRESS

Newspaper Declared Greatest Medium for Education on Health Matters in Country Today.

Chicago, March 12 .- Calling the newspaper the greatest medium for medical education of the public, Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical association, analyzed the press accounts of medical news before members of the American medical association today at the closing session of the annual congress on medical education, licensure, public health and hospitals. Dr. Fishbein laid particular emphasis on the tendency of newspapers to print or in any way established.

"The cures for tuberculosis, for cancer and for pneumonia have become the bane of medical life," he "The moment such announcements are broadcast, physicians are besieged by patients for information which they are unable to give because the newness of the discovery does not warrant any accurate judg-

Dr. Fishbein flayed the "publicity hound," saying "due to lack of scientific knowledge, the average reporter falls an easy prey to the medical exploiter of the press. In this way, these men take advantage of the public's desire for scientific news for individual gain.

"The newspapers try to play fair with their readers, but it often becomes a question of whether the best judgment has been used.

"I think I am safe in saying that the medical education of the public is the one certain method of overcoming the evils of quackery, of cultism, and of medical fraud."
