BIBLE SCHOOL LESSON

Sunday, August 9, 1925.

A New Alignment

Golden Text: "He shall have dominion: also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the end of the earth. Psalms 72:8.

The two missionaries Barnabas and Paul had braved the foreign country with its opposition, its hardships and its dangers in many ways but they had succeeded. They had carried the message of the Master to those who did not know him or of his mission on earth that mankind might be redeemed and that salvation might be available to all. This was the message and the way in which these bold missionaries told the story had won many to the cause of the Master and many good working churches had been established and in many places when Paul and Barnabas had returned and found the church much enlarged and found with the question of circumcision and having made their journey to Jerusalem with success settling this vexed question in a way most satisfactory that Gentiles in becoming Christians did not have to enter the Jewish church but were made Christians when they believed that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of God, the Saviour of the world and in the believing to obey his commands. They, after the settlement of these things at the church at Antioch sent a possibility of the other churches being likewise troubled with this or like questions. They discussed the matter of visiting the churches which they had established and confirming them in their beliefs. In arranging their trip Barnabas thought it better to go with another man, John Mark, but Paul thought not so it was arranged that Paul and Silas would go together and Barnabas and John Mark, thus making two excellent teams in the place of one. They thus departed, going in opposite directions with one object in view, that of carrying the message of the Master to those who had not heard it, for on the ascension of Christ to heaven he had placed the matter of the organization of the church in the hands of men, when he said, "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world, amen." They, Paul and Silas, went together. Now Silas was an able man and filled with the Holy Spirit, they going first through Syria and Cilicia where Paul had preached even before called by Barnabas to come to Antioch and had established churches. They, Paul and Silas, went together and confirmed them in the faith and gave them the decrees that at first when he had preached he had not time to go over all the things which were necessary and no doubt they delivered the discussion of the church at Jerusalem and assuring them that no greater burdens than were necessary would be laid on them. They then came to Derbe and Lystra where Paul and Barnabas had founded churches and found them good live working organizations.

Here they found a certain disciple named Timothy who Paul desired to bring with them for he was a valuable man in the ministry. He was the son of a woman who was a Jewess but the father was a Greek while he had been taught by his mother the law of Moses and was very conversant with the scriptures and believed in the Christ, he having a Jewish mother had never been circumcised and in order not to offend the Jews, Paul with his consent circumcised him thus Paul as he had afterward said he had been all things to all people. Paul who had thought of becoming a Christian to become a Christian without the formality of first becoming Jews, but takes a Jew and circumcised him that offense might not come to any who might accept the Christ.

In this lesson when two good men disagreed it did not drive them from the church or from working in the name and for the cause of the Master he made three more missionaries, Silas, Timothy and John Mark, not alone were the churches which had been established before strengthened and the membership increased, but many new churches were established and the cause of the Master increased.

The mission which Christ laid on the shoulders of the disciples was to look after the welfare of the churches as well as establish new ones for he said to Peter, "Simon Peter, son of Jonas, lovest thou me more than these, meaning more than the occupation of fishing and when Peter answered Yea Lord, thou knowest I love thee. The Master said, Feed my sheep. So was the epistle or book of James written, it being a book of instruction to the churches and a guide to right living.

In the present time the minister is expected to look after the welfare of the flock, but if a church would prosper it is necessary for every member to do all he can for the best working of every member of the church encourage those who need encouragement and help those who need help in living a Christian life.

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COURT WRIT SOUGHT BY W. RAY SIMMONS

Attorneys Claim Reprives Issued by C. W. Bryan While Out of the State Are Void.

Another attempt to secure thru habeas corpus proceedings relief for Walter Ray Simmons, Boyd county murderer, sentenced to die in the electric chair at the penitentiary August 17, was started Monday morning, when his attorneys filed a petition attacking reprives granted by Ex-Governor Bryan while he was outside the state, in district court. The case was set for hearing at 9 a. m. Tuesday.

Much of the evidence formerly presented by the attorneys to the board of pardons at various times, and at the several unsuccessful court actions, was included in the petition. Judge Mason Wheeler issued the writ and set the case for hearing. The question before the court at this time is largely one of law and Simmons will not be brought from the closely guarded death cell in the hospital, where he has been confined since his attempt to break out of the west cell house of the penitentiary on the night of July 16. Simmons' attorneys indicated that very little testimony would be offered but that the argument would be quite extensive.

BROOKHART IS THOUSAND VOTES AHEAD IN TALLY

Washington, D. C., Aug. 2.—THE official tabulation of the recent twenty-five counties in the Iowa senatorial contest, made public today, gave Brookhart 195,473 unopposed votes and Steek 194,151, while in the same counties there had been challenged 1,425 Brookhart and 413 Steek ballots.

FORD'S BID FOR 200 U. S. SHIPS IS ACCEPTED

Washington, Aug. 4.—Sale of the 2 hundred vessels for scrapping was awarded to Henry Ford today by the shipping board. His bid was \$17,700,000.

The vote was 4 to 1, with Commissioner Benson, who has opposed sale of the ships for scrapping, casting the negative ballot.
