Mrs. John Carmack, well known former Plattsmouth lady, was serious ly, if not fatally, injured Monday at Omaha when she was struck by a passing auto near the Brandels stores in that city, as she was alighting from her car to enter the store where she has been engaged as manager of the basement crug store department

Mrs. Carmack with a companion, Mrss Dorothy Bowman, cashier in the store, had just stepped from the car on south, when a car coming at a good rate of speed from the south struck Mrs. Carmack. The unfortanate woman was struck and knocked to the paving and dragged some fiftoen feet before the car could be stopped and the injured and mangied

weman pulled from beneath the car. The car that struck Mrs. Carmack was driven by Howard R. Cunningwho after the accident hurried Mrs. Carmack to the police station where the case was reported and the injared woman was then taken to the Lord Lister hospital for treatment and examination to determine the extent of her injuries.

The examination at the hospita disclosed the fact that the injured woman was suffering from a crushed vertebrae, a severe injury to the hip and Mrs. Carmack complained a great deal of pain in her breast, but the x-ray failed to reveal any broken ribs.
